In the meantime, thinking voters are sinking far-ther and farther into the field of confusion. What he stands for, what he is going to try and do, specific issues, are lost in a maze of personal accusations.

Confusing the voter seems to be smart politics—but is it the way to elect public officials? Could this procedure have anything to do with the lack of interest at the polls?

Voters have a job on their hands, cutting the confusion in order to find the real issues involved, the real qualities of the man. However, it must be done if we are to discourage this kind of a campaign and elect to public office men who can and will run our various branches of government with wisdom, courage and resourcefulness.
