Grass Is Greener . . .

and campaign speeches are hotter about this time of the year.

It is easy to explain about the grass — but as for the political speeches there is no explanation, except that they are not new. Mud slinging — name calling — petty bickering seem to be the normal steps on the way to public office. Candidates seem to feel that sensational accusations, running down an opponent, is the way to catch the voters' attention.

Political speeches, like grass, seem to grow only when the campaign gets warm and the rains of personal conflict begin to fall. Some call it smart politics — some call it shrewd campaigning — one thing is certain — it happens in every campaign to one degree or another. It seems to be more than the order of the day in the present Republican primary.

In the meantime, thinking voters are sinking farther and farther into the field of confusion. All they can see or hear about the candidates or from the candidates is what a misfit his opponents are. What he stands for, what he is going to try and do, specific issues, are lost in a maze of personal accusations.

Confusing the voter seems to be smart politics — but is it the way to elect public officials? Could this procedure have anything to do with the lack of interest at the polls?

Voters have a job on their hands, cutting away the confusion in order to find the real issues involved, the real qualities of the man. However, it must be done if we are to discourage this kind of a campaign and elect to public office men who can and will run our various branches of government with wisdom, courage and resourcefulness.

a picture — a test that can convince drivers that carelessness on the highway means injuring, suffering and death.

If we could find just one thing that would cut down traffic accidents we would have something. In spite of editorials, news stories, headlines, pictures, lectures and even first hand views of death, the driver does not seem impressed that it can happen to him.

On this past Memorial Day week end, hundreds of Americans were killed on the highway. They were killed in spite of a nation-wide safety campaign now in effect. A large portion of these accidents were caused by carelessness. Drivers, who in their desire to get where they were going, disregarded every rule of the road — not stopping for stop streets, crossing yellow warning lines, passing on blind curves or seeing how fast the old bus would go. A lot of them didn't get there. Some will never get anywhere again — others will spend months in hospitals. Was it worth it?

Think about it when you get behind that wheel — if you want to get to your destination, don't be careless! Think it over — not just now, but all the time.

Tighter enforcement of Michigan liquor control regulations is resulting in a new campaign by wets to get the state out of the liquor business. Robert D. Ward, former Detroit state representative who led a drive against the 13th amendment, is spearheading the 1946 movement. Ward proposes a super-super state commission of 15 members, each getting \$7,500 salary and \$2,500 expenses. Liquor dealers would buy direct from the distillers instead of from the state of Michigan which now takes a 30 to 35 per cent "cut" of profits. The retailers' profit would be boosted about 100 per cent, and the consumer would pay more for each bottle — estimated now at 87 cents.

Licenses cannot transfer their liquor license to another person for a period of one year after they have been obtained.

New applicants must take a written examination — first of its kind in the nation.

A minimum 30-day investigation period now prevails for transfer requests.

The assessment to defray cost of investigation into license transfer is raised from \$10 to \$35.

More strikes in Michigan are in the offing as a result of the 15¢ cents per hour pay boost given to automotive, steel, electrical, railroad and coal mining workers.

John P. Boyer, chairman of the regional wage stabilization board at Detroit, recently completed a survey of post-war wage increases in Michigan. A study of 1080 applications involving 200,000 workers revealed that only 15 per cent asked for 15¢ cent increases. Why only 15 per cent? Employers had already upped wages and a lessening was required to equalize the right in cost of living. That is where the trouble will begin. . . .

Coal prices are expected to rise from 35 to 60 cents a ton. Wage increases must be paid by the consumer. The feather theory of wage increases being paid out of industrial profits is an economic fallacy. Ask the OPA!

The legislative bonus committee will meet June 26 at Lansing to consider its final report. It is likely that the voters will be given an opportunity to authorize or reject a bond issue. State government cannot issue bonds without first getting the voters' approval by referendum. . . . A suspicion: Candidates for office are more interested in a bonus than are the voters themselves. . . .

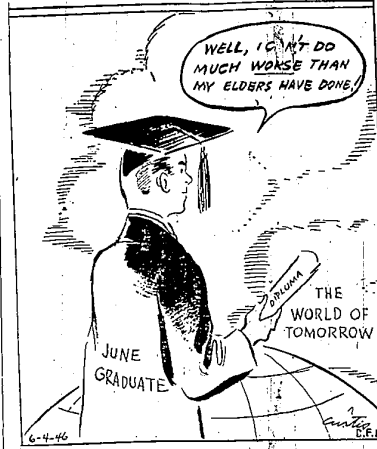
Michigan peach and sour cherry prospects are good for 1946. Anticipated are fair crops of apples, tart plums, grapes and strawberries. Bean acreage is 28 per cent less than the 10-year average.

The new price raise for dairy products is due to increased cost and a determination of Congress to slash food subsidies.

Charles M. Ziegler, state highway commissioner, says low road and bridges will be built this year because of the coal and steel strikes. Contractors are unemployed.

close of the school year. The controlling box, if it decides to proceed upon such charges, shall furnish the teacher with a written statement of the charges and shall provide for a hearing to take place not less than thirty nor more than forty-five days after the filing of such charges. No action shall be taken resulting in demotion or dismissal except by majority vote of the controlling board.

How Does the Probationary Period Benefit the Teachers and the Board? Under the Michigan tenure law, employers are given a period of two years during which time the teacher is on probation. They have the opportunity to observe the teacher at work and to decide whether or not they wish to give him a continuing contract (place him on tenure). If they feel the need for it, upon written notice to the State Tenure Commission, they may have an additional year in which to make up their minds about the teacher. The probationary period acts as a sort of filter to eliminate undesirable teachers rather than put them on tenure. This insures a more careful selection of teachers and reduces the number of quackisms which otherwise might have been necessary later.

Why Is Tenure Needed? Districts having tenure have found it helps maintain a full corps of well-trained, efficient, satisfied teachers, who know they have security as long as they do their work well.

What Michigan Districts Have Tenure — Center Line, Ann Arbor, Highland Park, Dearborn, Flint, Royal Oak, Garden City, Melvindale, Lincoln Park, Port Huron and Van Dyke.

Do Many States Have Tenure? Twenty-two states have tenure, most of them statewide; seven have statewide continuing contracts. States like California, New York, Pennsylvania and the District of Columbia — known for their excellent school systems — have adopted the law.

If, After Adopting Tenure, a District Feels It Is Unsatisfactory, How Can It Be Discontinued? Any election called for that purpose, a majority of the electors in said district voting thereon can vote that the act shall no longer be in effect. Said act shall not be in effect until submitted at any general or special election.

Other boards set up policies requiring continued professional training. If at any time a teacher does not efficiently perform his teaching duties and live up to the policies of the board, he may be discharged. Excerpts from Article IV, Sections 1 and 2: "Discharge of a teacher shall be made only for a reasonable and just cause. Charges against the teacher shall be made in writing, signed by the person making the same, and filed with the secretary, clerk, or other designated officer of the controlling board. Provided, That such charges concerning the character of professional services shall be filed at least sixty days before the
