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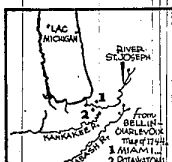

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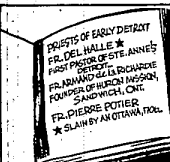
MICHIGAN AND THE OLD NORTHWEST — Mission At Sandwich

NEW CIVIC ASSOCIATION NAMES OBJECTS

The second meeting of the Grand River, Seven Mile (Angling to Inkster) Civic Association was held recently at the Clear Lakeville High School. Irving Harris acted as chairman, and stated the reasons for organizing in this area, namely to secure water and sewers, improve roads, establish a playground, secure street lights, and what is of great importance, fire-fighting equipment. This program will mean careful planning and hard work over an extended period of time by members of the Association. Water and sewers are a vital necessity and to be considered first. Plans are already made for a sewer along Inkster Road, and property owner have been billed for their share of the costs. However no provision has been made to put in laterals along the side streets west of Angling Road. Water is now in as far down as Norfolk from Grand River, including that section of Angling Road and along Inkster. It is hoped that this system can be extended. Harry Stolkner resigned from the committee inasmuch as his business requires him to be away much of the time, and Howard Dorr, 2624 Long was appointed in his place. Mr. Kramer was appointed in the place of Grace Duckett.

Harry Wolfe, Livonia Township Clerk, has indicated his willingness to attend a meeting and provide any information that he can, and answer questions of the members.

The Association has adopted a Constitution. The object is stated as "community betterment of all kinds and especially for this area; that portion of Livonia Township bounded by Grand River Road, Inkster Road, Seven Mile Road and all property facing Angling Road." All qualified voters interested in the betterment of this district are eligible for membership.

The association will meet again on Tuesday, July 9, at the Clear Lakeville High School on Middlebelt Road, at 8:00 p.m.

Deadline For Veteran Re-Enlistment June 30

Captain F. A. Trumpf, the local Recruiting Officer, states that June 30, 1946, is an important date for thousands of Army veterans now in civilian life. Between now and June 30, thousands of Army veterans will reenlist in the Regular Army because men who have been discharged and are spending their ninety (90) day grace period at home, are able to return to the Army in the highest grade held whether temporary or permanent at time of discharge.

Men with six months or more of satisfactory service, discharged as privates, and are still within their ninety day grace period, may enlist in the Army in the grade of Private First Class.

These special privileges are typical of the new law recently passed by Congress. Few opportunities for a life time career offer as many attractive advantages.

Can you think of any other job that would give you good pay, your food, clothing, quarters, free medical and dental care, worldwide travel, 30 days' furlough every year, education and training in any of nearly 200 skills or trades, and enable you to retire with a life income any time after 20 years' service?

1. Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 years. (1-year enlistments permitted for men with 6 months' service and still in the service.)

2. Men reenlisting retain their present grades if they reenlist within 90 days after discharge and before June 30, 1946.

3. An increase in the reenlistment bonus to \$50 for each year of active service since the bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service.

4. 20 percent extra pay when overseas.

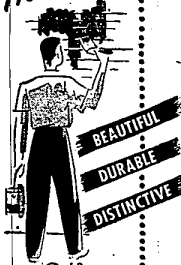
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
