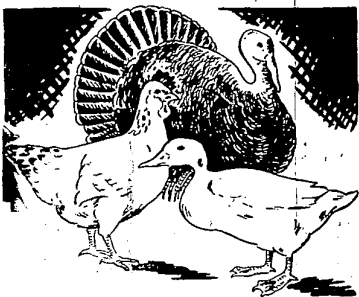

OAKLAND COUNTY RED CROSS NOTES

Five hundred and fifty individuals attended the Water Safety program of the Oakland County Chapter American Red Cross last week according to Mark Smith, chairman of the committee. In spite of cold and rainy weather this number of individuals enrolled in the program which began at 12 beaches and pools of the county. Those who were unable to enroll because of the bad weather are urged to attend classes in their own neighborhood in order that they may have an opportunity to complete tests before the program closes. Adults who wish to swim may also enroll in the classes. An opportunity will be given to complete the beginners, swimmers, intermediate and advanced swimming tests. Junior and Senior Life Guard will also be taught. Red Cross certificates will be awarded those who satisfactorily complete any of the tests. Instructors will instruct classes at East St. Walpole Lake, Friday 10:00 a.m.

According to Mrs. Sheldon Noble, chairman of Home Service of the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, the local chapter is ready to assist veterans with their claims as well as any other problem which may arise. "It is impossible to emphasize too strongly the importance of each veteran filing a disability claim if he cannot do of service with any condition which was incurred or aggravated by service during the war."

While a monetary award may not be forthcoming at the present time it is most important to establish service connection now while records are still fresh and available. A veteran may not be affected too seriously by a disability now but chapter experience with veterans of World War I shows that in later years the disability may become worse. If service connection has been established an ex-serviceman will be more immediately eligible for benefits from the Veterans Administration. It is suggested by Red Cross that each veteran have a complete physical examination by a civilian physician sometime within a year after date of discharge. There are many disabilities which are considered service connected if they appear within a year after separation from service. Veterans who

wish questions answered may call either of the two Chapter Home Service offices. One office is located at 410 Pontiac State Bldg., tel. 4-551; the other which serves Southern Oakland County at 321 W. Sixth, Royal Oak, Tel. Lincoln 2-6700.

There was no motorcycle escort and while the car was moving along Constitution avenue at a fair speed, there came very near to being re-enacted an accident similar to that which cost General Patton his life. A truck dashed to a side street toward the official automobile. Fortunately the brakes of the Presidential car held. The party had a bad shake-up, but that was all.

It might have been otherwise. The newly appointed and not over popular Secretary of the Treasury, Snyder might have had to move next door. After the secretary of state, who shared the near-miss with the President, the secretary of the Treasury is next in line of succession.

This is not the first time Mr. Truman has taken risks. But he is by no means the only President who has worried Secret Service men whose care the lives of the Chief Executives are entrusted under the law.

A certain amount of speed is desired at times when a presidential party is passing through strange territory but, as a rule, the White House chauffeurs who are specially picked men, "loaned" by the army, if left by themselves, lean to the safe and not the sorry side.

Mr. and Mrs. John G. Smith, Lois and Jim VanEver are spending a two week vacation at Little Bear Lake near Lewiston.

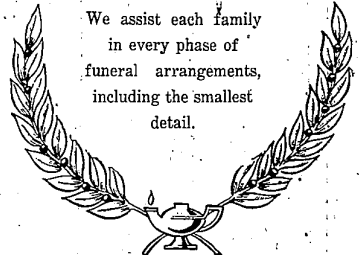

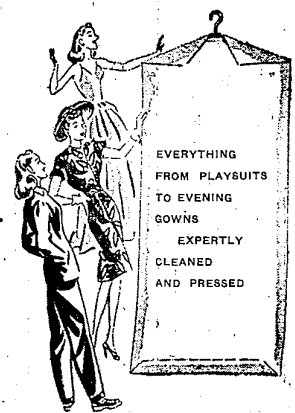

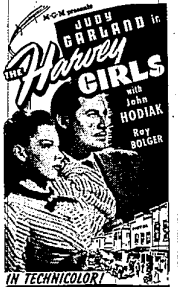
