The Green Thumb

Home grown tomatoes: The catalogs are in and now you're wondering which are the best tomato seeds to order.

May we remind you that there is no best tomato for all purposes. Your bet is to grow two or three different varieties and you won't grow wrong. Be sure to include a hybrid such as Big Boy or Morton Hybrid.

If you want one that's disease and crack resistant try Heinz 1350. Superonic is a heavy yielding hybrid to keep your eye on. It's a late variety (about 80 days). Glamour is crack-resistant and a very mild tomato for folks who can't eat any acid type.

Sun-Ray is a yellow-orange tomato with a mild flavor. If you can't get this one, grow an old favorite known as Golden Jubilee, similar to Sun-Ray but not resistant to fusarium wilt.

NOTE: To start tomato seed, use a loose mixture, containing vermiculite, perlite, peat moss and sand. Or buy the prepared materials such as Jiffy-Mix or Pro-Mix, starting mediums which are practically sterile. Press the seed into the soil and barely cover.

Place a glass pane or plastic sheet over after watering thoroughly. The sheet or pane of glass prevents the soil from drying out. Remove as soon as germination starts!

Best heat for germination is anywhere from 72 to 80 degrees. Seeds germinate poorly when temperature is less than 70 degrees.

Peppers like it even warmer for germination. They won't germinate if the temperature is less than 72 degrees.

GIANT PUMPKIN contest: How about getting your children interested in gardening? We still have a good supply of giant pumpkin seeds furnished us by the Men's Garden Club of America. PLANT APPLE SEEDS? What happens if you plant apple seeds. Do you get edible fruit? Your chances for edible fruit are slim - perhaps 1 in 10,000. The home gardener would be foolish to nurse an apple tree started from a seed.

Why? The seedling would probably grow into "common" fruit, unless you do what nurserymen do: bud or graft cultivated fruit on the wild seedling. You might better buy a budded tree from the nursery.

You know you'll get edible fruit that way, and besides the tree will be a good for shade and giving off oxygen.

March: Late Blizzards Or Bright Blossoms?

March is a season for all men - drifting snow and wintry gales, bright sun, fog and rain, gusty winds, and perhaps a few days that are gentle and mild. There's something for everyone no matter which season you favor because the essence of March is change - change from day to day, from hour to hour, from winter to spring.

March is the month that brings hope to the gardener, but often dashes his hopes with a late season blizzard. Then again, it can beguile him with bright blossoms.

This is the month for the gardener to wait patiently, but to prepare for the busy season that lies ahead.

Don't do any digging or planting until the soil is warm and dry and crumbly, but take another look at the catalogs and seed racks and order seeds and plants for planting later in the season, or to start indoors.

Starting seeds indoors now can give the gardener a real head start. The little plants should be just the right size to set out in the garden in late May.

IF YOU HAVE kept a notebook in past seasons - and every good gardener should - check it in for records of past successes and failures and notes on what varieties were planted. It is fun to be able to look back to see when the first robin was spotted last year and when the first crocus came into bloom. Some years spring comes early, and others late. Somehow, though, it all evens out eventually.

Before the work begins in earnest, make a schedule of jobs to be done and the best time to do them. Feed the lawn and trees and shrubs in early April. Plant deciduous trees and shrubs in April. Plant evergreens and perennials in May. Plant radishes and peas and lettuce as soon as the ground is dry and can be worked.

Set out tomatoes and petunias and other tender plants the end of May, and plant beans and marigolds and seeds of other tender plants late in May or in early June.

Take the time to make a plan on paper before you do any major landscape planting. This takes a little time and effort but saves a lot of each in the long run. Whether you are planning the entire landscaping for a new house, remodeling old landscaping or redoing a flower bed, it is easier to try out ideas on paper than to move actual plants around in the garden.

You do not have to be an artist to do this. Even a simple rough sketch is helpful. It is most useful, though if you get out and measure the space you are planning and make the drawing "to scale." A convenient scale is to let one inch on the paper equal eight feet in the garden. If the area is small, let one inch equal four feet. Graph paper is handy to use and comes marked in 1/4 inch squares.

IF MILD DAYS lure you outside, tidy the yard and garden beds, or do some pruning. Check trees and shrubs for broken or diseased branches and remove them. Trim a bit here and there to improve the shape of a plant. Don't give them a severe clipping so that they look stiff and rigid.

Keep the natural, graceful form. Just help nature along. Prune summer bloomers now but wait to prune early blooming shrubs so no blossoms will be sacrificed.

However, for a real spring preview, prune a few branches of Forsythia, flowering quince or even crabapple. Bring them inside and arrange them in a vase of warm water and in a week, they will be in bloom.

How To Adjust Roller Springs

Window shades are rarely heir to mechanical problems but it is nice to know what to do if some small inconvenience does arise.

A too-tight spring can easily be remedied. Roll the shade up to the top, remove it from its brackets and unroll, but not more than two revolutions of the cloth. Then, replace it and roll up again.
