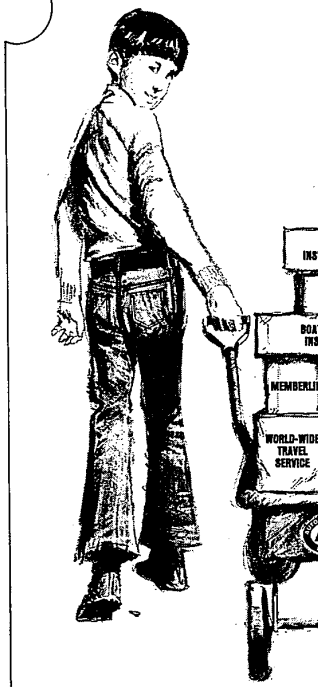
Admission is \$1 at the door for those attending the opening performance March 23 and \$2.50 each at the door on March 24, 25.

NFHS Senior's Winner

A North Farmington High senior has won a national award for a research paper on the availability of jobs for the handicapped in the Farmington area.

Leslie Kaye recently was awarded fifth prize in the annual "ability counts survey contest" sponsored by the President's Committee for the Handicapped.

The contest is aimed at informing the public, especially the business sector, about the untapped manpower of the handicapped.

Miss Kaye's research paper was based on Mrs. Mary Wagner, former special education teacher at North Farmington High. The paper centered on the New Horizons workshop for the mentally handicapped at Haggerty and Grand River and Farmington and on two Community Living Centers operated by Mrs. Wagner in Farmington.

She also mentioned the special education department at North Farmington High and discussed employers who hire the handicapped.

The price for the fifth place prize has yet to be announced but last year the fifth place winner received a \$25 cash award.

Miss Kaye, her parents and English teacher, Mrs. Margaret Chamberlin, are planning to attend the April 12 banquet for contest winners in Lansing.

FHS Bands Win Ratings

FARMINGTON Farmington High School has three entries in the recent District IV Band and Orchestra Festival and were awarded two "I" ratings and one "II" rating.

The orchestra received a "I" rating in Class AA competition, the concert band received a "I" rating in Class A, and the wind ensemble received a "II" rating in Class AA.

Harold Kacanek, director of FHS Instrumental Music, said there were a number of firsts associated with this festival. It is the first time an orchestra from a Farmington high school has been entered. The concert band's "I" rating was the first "I" rating earned by a band in the history of Farmington High School and this was Kacanek's first year as director of instrumental music.

Kacanek stated that the music program is expanding at FHS because the number of instrumental music students is increasing and their enthusiasm and interest as well.

C. C. Wieder Dies At 64

Charles C. Wieder, president of Campbell Engineering Co. of Detroit and a 15-year resident of Farmington, died suddenly Monday evening in Providence Hospital, Southfield. Cause is still being investigated.

Mr. Wieder, 64, of 28761 Aranel, was a registered professional in land surveying and civil engineering. A graduate of what is now Michigan Technical University, he served in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers during World War II.

Funeral services will be held Thursday at 1 p.m. in North Congregational Church, 26275 Northwestern Highway, and burial will be in Calumet. Arrangements will be by the Halley Funeral Home, Southfield.
