Wacs May Reenlist For Service In Europe

A bulletin just received from the War Department has reopened WAC enlistments for the European Theater, announced Lt. R. Welschker, of the Pontiac Recruiting Station. The Commanding General of the European Theater has stated that members of the WAC have done an outstanding job overseas, and due to the excellence of their work, more are desired by administrative commands.

At present, WACs who formerly had experience as stenographers, general clerks, statistical clerks, typewriter operator, clerk-typist, administrative N.C.O., telephone switchboard operator, cryptographic technician, or supply clerk, may re-enlist specifically for the European Theater.

To qualify for this assignment, former WAC members must re-enlist for the duration and six months and agree to stay overseas for a minimum of one year.

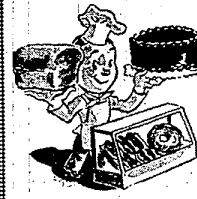

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REPORT OF ANNUAL MEETING FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP SCHOOL DISTRICT July 8, 1946

The annual meeting of Farmington Township School District was held in the gymnasium, July 8, 1946.

The meeting was called to order by President Aschenbrenner.

Members present: President Aschenbrenner, Jesse A. Early, Paul H. Schraaben. Also present: 11 people from the District.

1. Minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.

2. President Aschenbrenner requested Mr. Glenn Leland, Auditor of the financial records of the District, to read the Financial Report. The Financial Report was read, all questions answered by Mr. Leland and the report was approved.

3. A report prepared by Mr. E. V. Ayres, retiring Superintendent, was read and accepted.

4. President Aschenbrenner requested an expression from the people regarding their wishes as to pay for members of the Board of Education.

5. Motion by Mrs. George Pultord that the Board Members be paid the same as they received prior to 1945 was lost for want of support.

6. Motion by Mrs. W. H. McCullough, supported by Mrs. George Pultord that the Board receive \$400.00 yearly salary and that the above amount be allotted to the various members as the Board deemed fit, Motion carried.

7. Mr. Joseph K. Boltz offered a suggestion that an expense account be set up to cover expenses of Board Members when called outside the district on school business. A majority of the people, now numbering 22, seemed to favor the idea.

8. Motion by Mrs. George Pultord, supported by Mr. Edward Moseman that \$200.00 be added to cover expenses of Board Members when called outside the District on school business. Motion carried.

9. President Aschenbrenner asked for action on the disposal of the property located at the corner of Nine Mile and Halsted Roads, known as the Thayer School. After considerable discussion regarding the condition of the building and the likelihood of the school being needed in a future expansion program, it was generally agreed that the site should be sold.

10. Motion by Mr. Joseph K. Boltz, supported by Mrs. W. H. McCullough that: the Board be given authority to dispose of the Thayer School site. After considerable discussion regarding the method of disposal of the property, Mr. Leo Newman amended the motion by inserting the clause "that the property be appraised and sold for this sum." The amendment was lost for want of support. A vote on the original motion carried and the Board was authorized to use its own discretion in disposing of the site.

12. President Aschenbrenner read the Budget announcement and answered several questions regarding the expenditure of certain monies.

13. Motion by Archie Leonard, supported by Mr. Edward Moseman to adjourn. Motion carried.

Adjournment at 7:45 p.m.
