GARDEN CLUB FLOWER SHOW OPEN TO ALL

The Farmington Garden Club has arranged a special classification for Junior exhibitors at the fall Flower Show, to be held Saturday, September 14, at Farmington Town Hall. Cash prizes, as well as ribbons, will be awarded to the winners.

In the first group, children from six to 11 years of age, will enter exhibits on arrangements for the teacher's desk, and child's dresser. Those 12 to 16 years of age

will enter arrangements for a breakfast table, and for a porch table. All ages are allowed to participate in arrangements of roadside material, and corsages. On September 5, at the High School Gymnasium, beginning at 1:30 p.m., Mrs. Ernest Knobloch of Detroit will give a demonstration and lecture for all children of the community, on flower arrangement. Mothers, too, will find this very interesting and instructive, and they are cordially invited to attend. Mrs. Knobloch is well known for her work in this field.

One of Farmington's most successful baseball seasons in several years is nearing a close as the American Legion Senior Nine, the only squad in this area with remaining games, finishes their schedule within the next two weeks.

The Junior Legion, whose season ended several weeks ago, showed very promising improvement from the beginning of the year and should rank high in next season's competition with a thoroughly experienced squad.

The Senior Legion made up of World War II veterans who have been away from the game for 15 months to three years, showed their outstanding ability by capturing better than 75 per cent of their title. Because of late organizing the Legion lads were unable to enter league competition.

Under the able coaching of Bob Werschni the vets have developed into one of the county's top-notch teams in their class, and next season they expect to beat this year's record.

Although the Farmington fans won't be able to enjoy the Sunday afternoon baseball games much longer they will be able to get an eyeful of platoon play before long when the Farmington Falcons begin their 1946 football season in the recently organized Inter-Lakes Conference which includes Mott, Keego Harbor, Walled Lake, Northville and Farmington. Aside from these league games the Falcons have several non-league tilts including two night games.

Coach Hutton's boys have been under training rules for the past four weeks and will begin their practice sessions within the very near future.

"BAN THE ATOMIC BOMB"



WASHINGTON, D.C. — Soundphoto — Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal declared that an "enforceable plan" must be adopted to ban the atomic bomb. Forrestal's statement was made at a news conference at the Navy Department in which Adm. W. H. P. Blandy, "Operations Crossroads" Chief, urged swift redrafting of naval vessels to enable them to withstand the "most insidious weapon of all time." Lt. to R. Vice Adm. W. H. P. Blandy; Dr. Ralph A. WAR HEROES FORM GUARD FOR VFW ENCAMPMENT

Forty-eight Congressional Medal of Honor men, one from each State, will form the Guard of Honor for the National Encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, at Boston September 1 to 6. These holders of the nation's highest military award will serve as an honorary escort to General Dwight D. Eisenhower, Chief of Staff of the U.S. Army and Supreme Commander of the Allied Expeditionary Forces in World War II, when he addresses the encampment on September 2.

This will be the first full-dress National convention of a major veterans' organization since the end of World War II. While the business sessions will have a serious tone in keeping with the scope of the problems facing veterans, the entertainment and recreational features will be more colorful and extensive than at any previous V.F.W. national encampment.

A parade, drum and bugle corps contests, and military ball will be staged. Clambakes, sailing trips, and tours to points of historic interest are included in the program designed to give the delegates and visitors a variety of entertainment along with the serious work of the convention.

The Congressional Medal of Honor holders to serve on the Guard of Honor will be chosen by the V.F.W. Department commanders of the various states. Commander Tardy of Farmington Post 4032, V.F.W., is asking that all delegates from Farmington to the Convention, contact him as soon as possible.

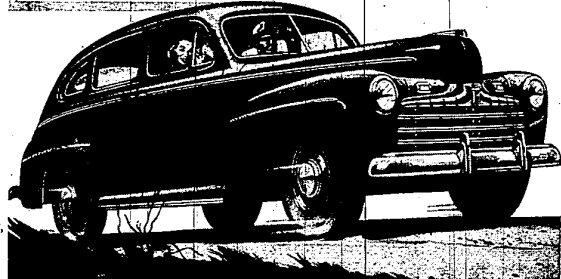
