James McCully Gets 4-H Award

James McCully, Farmington was among the 141 local winners of 4-H clubs honored at the State 4-H Club show at Michigan State college at East Lansing Tuesday night.

He was awarded the Pearl 4-H Clover Award for 15 years of service as a local 4-H club leader.

Six of the awards—the emerald 4-H clover award—were for 25 years service as a local 4-H club leader. Eight were diamond awards for 20 years of service. Twenty-nine won pearl awards for 15 years' service and 98 gold awards for 10 years of service were awarded.

The awards were made by E. J. Leenhouts, general agricultural representative of the New York Central system.

On the same program, Fay Uplight, Charlotte, outstanding Michigan 4-H club member, presented to Harry F. Kelly, governor of Michigan, and Charles L. Figg, commissioner of agriculture, plaques as citation for outstanding service to Michigan 4-H clubs.

Commissioner Figg and Governor Kelly have aided materially in making possible the annual State 4-H Club show at which from 1,500 to 2,000 farm youth compete for honors and a portion of the \$18,000 in prize money offered.

MICHIGAN FARMERS SHOW INTEREST IN IRRIGATION

One way to insure the intensity and spread of the July and August drought is to see the number of inquiries concerning irrigation coming into the department of agricultural engineering at Michigan State college, Frank W. Pelkert, specialist in irrigation, says some farmers want to know where they can get equipment "right now to save my crops" and others take the more logical view of looking into irrigation for the future.

"Equipment purchase is possible—but still difficult," is the way Pelkert answers the question about the availability of pumps, motors, engines, pipe and accessories.

He urges that the farmer considering irrigation for the next year starts now to make his plans. Where high-valued crops are being produced, irrigation is paying good dividends. In dry years a system may pay for itself in one season. Even in good seasons of normal rainfall, an irrigation system usually shows good returns on investment.

Special crops with high dollar per acre yield such as berries, potatoes, beans, tomatoes, truck vegetables, nursery stock, bulbs and flowers, and in some cases orchards, can use irrigation. Such irrigation usually produces higher net profits per acre through yields of better quality products.

Don't Plant Wheat Too Early

It is not a project the average farmer can go into without some technical advice," Pelkert warns.

County agricultural agents of the department of agricultural engineering at Michigan State college can be of assistance to farmers interested in irrigation. Pelkert also says that concerns that hand irrigation supplies can offer such advice.

Smoking Fat

To get the best use from fat in cooking as well as to save it for use again, he said the "no smoking" rule. When fat reaches the smoking point, it starts to break down chemically and three unfortunate things happen: the flavor of the fat and of the food cooked in it is damaged; food fed to animals will have an unhappy effect on the digestive tract; fat that has reached the smoking point will turn rancid more quickly than fat which has not smoked. If saved for use again, it will be of less value.

To prevent fat from smoking, keep heat low when melting fat for sauce or pan-frying. Cook meat at moderate temperature which is best for the protein as well as the fat. Remember, fats vary in the amount of heat they can stand. Butter, margarine, drippings and olive oil all tend to smoke quickly.
