### HOWARD HUGHES TAKES TO THE AIR AGAIN



CULVER CITY, CALIF. — Soundphoto — Back in the air only a few weeks after winning a courageous fight for life, following the crash of an experimental airplane he was solo testing, Howard Hughes, noted aviator, aircraft designer and builder, piloted his plane, a converted Curtiss, toward New York. Still bearing evidence of burns and critical injuries, Hughes climbed out of his sick-bed, got into his plane and took off suddenly to challenge revocation of the seal of approval on his controversial, record-breaking motion picture, "The Outlaw." He took with him a mechanic, Earl Martin, and one passenger, a soldier returning home to his family, John Steeter.
