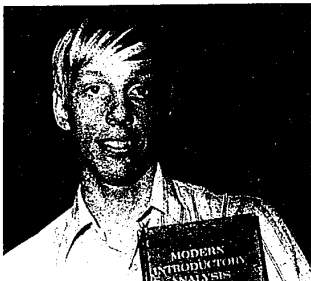


Priestaf Is Top In Math

In addition, none of the three wrenches available fitted the bolts. This meant removal had to be accomplished by pliers.

Mud had all but buried the bolt heads and that crud had to be scraped off before proceeding with pliers.

After three hours, the tank was removed, cleaned and flushed, and placed back in place. The battery was reconnected, car started, and washer button pushed — but still no squirts of water.

NEXT, I unhooked every rubber hose in the general vicinity of the washer tank, the windshield and what appeared to be the electric windshield washer motor.

My trusty coat hanger was run through each hose to undo any clogging. There was none. The hoses were then individually shaved up the kitchen faucet and water was run through each.

After spending a half hour reconnecting the hoses, I discovered that one of the nozzles at the windshield was broken, so I removed both. The other nozzle, although in one piece, had a leak which prevented the water from reaching its ultimate point.

Convinced I had located the difficulty, I called the auto dealer only to find the parts department was closed on

Saturdays. My enthusiasm could not be dimmed, so I went to the nearest junkyard and searched each junker on hand for an hour until finding two nozzles similar in appearance to those taken off wife's car.

While searching for the nozzles, I was bitten by a German shepherd dog on the premises which meant a brief interruption for tetanus shot, etc., but one hour later I was back under the hood with tools in hand.

The nozzles fit, but the second test again established that water was not going to squirt unto the windshield. My spirits dampened at this point, so I waited until the next day to try another approach.

NEXT DAY I drove to a gas station, disconnected what appeared to be the pertinent hoses connected to what appeared to be the washer motor and used an air hose to blow out any particles which might be clogged inside the motor.

Test number three was taken — and still the water remained in the tank and off the windshield.

Besides cleaning things out with coat hangers, another standard remedy of mine is to replace a fuse. The fuse for the washers looked good but was replaced anyhow...but still no squirts.

Smart aleck mechanics reading this column will tell me that my electrical washer motor needs replacing. My wife has also said this from the start.

But when I push the button to get squirts of water, the motor clicks, and it has always been a standing philosophy of mine that anything that clicks works. The thing still clicks in a logical pattern, but, having checked out all other conceivable malfunctions, I am finally resigned to replacing the motor and running test number four.

If that fails, my final plan to buy daughter a squirt gun on her next birthday. I have invested my life in that windshield wiper system, and no mechanic is going to get near enough to fix it.

Mr. Slocum, 80, was the husband of Mrs. Edessa Warner Slocum who is the daughter of an early Farmington resident, Fred M. Warner, one time governor of Michigan.

MR. SLOCUM, who retired from Manufacturers Bank in 1956, had been president of United Savings Bank in 1952 when the two banks merged. He had lived in Farmington for 52 years.

His many activities included: director of the Michigan Fire and Marine Insurance Co., American Red Cross and Michigan Welfare League; vice president, Salvation Army; trustee of Albion College, Wayne University and Detroit Institute of Technology; and past president of Detroit Rotary Club, American Bankers Association, Albion College Alumni Assn., and the Detroit Bankers Club.
