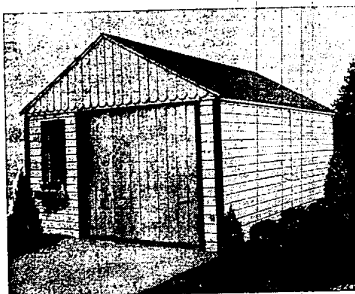

Dairy feed costs and expenditures for labor for milk producers of Michigan are at the highest peak in history, a recent study at Michigan State college reveals. Records of the Michigan Dairy Herd Improvement association — the oldest association in the United States — date back to 1921. Through these records, it has been determined that these costs are now the highest in history.

Dairy feed costs show that from December, 1944, to August, 1945, the average feed cost for producing a ton of milk in Michigan was \$34.25. Due to rising pasture; which necessitates purchasing of hard-to-get and high priced protein concentrates, the cost of dairy feed per animal has increased greatly in recent weeks.

Special studies reveal that it requires 132 hours of milking time per cow per year. At the average cost of 5 cents per hour, which most everyone will agree is far below comparative industrial and factory wages, it costs \$73.50 per year just to get a cow milked.

Progressive dairy farmers believe that more milk will be produced as a result of the recent action of the national decontrol board in limiting milk and dairy products from price control. When the cost of the subsidy, which taxpayers were paying for the milk consumer is considered, dairymen may the actual increase in price is not so much as the equivalent advance the farmer has experienced in the cost of feed and labor.

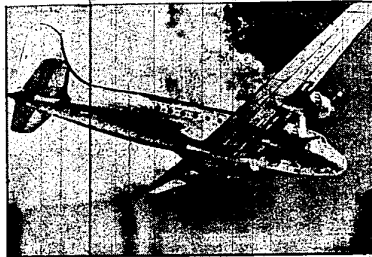

MICHIGAN COUNCIL OF CHURCHES TO HOLD CONVENTION

"One Christian World or Else" is the theme of the eighth annual convention of the Michigan Council of Churches and Christian Education and the Michigan Council of Church Women to be held in the First Methodist Church, Royal Oak, Michigan, October 28, 29 and 30, 1946.

Mr. Edgar Downs of Ferndale is the general chairman of the convention with Mrs. Lee Kinner of Royal Oak as co-chairman. In a general committee meeting Friday a list of committee chairmen was announced, and detailed plans for the entertaining of delegates to the convention as well as the completion of the convention program was the order of business.

Mr. M. J. Quiekstad of Royal Oak is the Registrar for the convention and states that he has selected registrars in all of the Council churches in South Oakland including Pontiac. The registration fee is \$1.00.

Dr. J. Burt Souwman, executive secretary of Michigan Council with Reverend Robert Fries as program chairman announce an outstanding list of challenging speakers. Dr. Charles Clayton Morrison, editor of the Christian Century, will be one of the featured speakers. Dr. Morrison speaks with authority on religious subjects and is regarded not only as an outstanding editor but one of the most challenging speakers on the theme of the convention. Dr. Morrison was in 1939 the Lyman Beecher lecturer at Yale University. These lectures are the in-

redients of his book "What Is Christianity."

In addition to Dr. Morrison, speakers will be Dr. Clarence Tucker Craig, Dr. Malcolm Dana and Dr. Paul G. Macy.

The convention committee consider the world conditions we find ourselves in a challenging time for the serious consideration of the Convention theme, "One Christian World or Else."
