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Mr. A. R. Musson, a representative of the Oakland County Tuberculosis Association, was guest speaker at last week's meeting of the Farmington Kiwanis Club.

He outlined what is being done by the county, state and federal government to control tuberculosis, stating that Oakland County has a very fine sanatorium. Tuberculosis is not necessarily a fatal disease, if discovered soon enough. The danger lies in not recognizing the symptoms of the disease. Mr. Musson advised everyone to have periodic checkups with their family physician. An intensive campaign is now being carried on to educate the public on ways and means of controlling tuberculosis. It is a disease that responds readily to treatment, if only people will recognize it, and secure care before it has advanced very far.

The sanatoriums, and the educational program now being carried on, are supported by the annual sale of Christmas seals, and are now maintained by tax. The dollars you give for the gay little Christmas seals undoubtedly do more good than almost any other dollar you spend during the year.

Ray Eichler was program chairman for the evening. Next week, at the October 2 meeting of the Kiwanis Club, Sam Kosmenko is in charge of the program. Earl Silver is the speaker for the day, and he will talk on the subject of "Boy Scouting."

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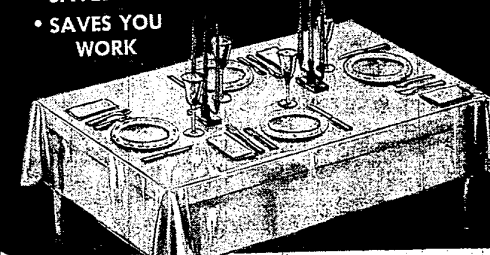

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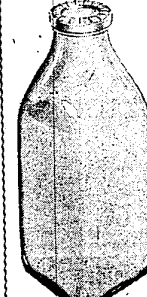
