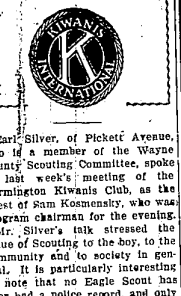


28TH NATIONAL AMERICAN LEGION CONVENTION

Earl Silver, of Pickett Avenue, who is a member of the Wayne County Scouting Committee, spoke at last week's meeting of the Farmington Kiwanis Club, as the guest of Sam Kosmoski, who was program chairman for the evening. Mr. Silver's talk stressed the value of Scouting to the boy, to the community and to society in general. It is particularly interesting to note that no Eagle Scout has ever had a police record, and only a very small percentage of boys who ever belonged to a Boy Scout group have ever become social problems.

Mr. Silver told of the tremendous contribution which the Boy Scouts have made during the war, and also the services they perform during the time of an emergency, such as a flood, or a fire.

Aside from the special services performed, the training which Scouts receive is of great benefit to each boy. The program of directed activity, including camping and the various handicraft instructions, is a great character builder, and teaches the boy how to utilize his time to the best advantage rather than having only undirected recreation.

Mr. Silver pointed out that Kiwanis and other service clubs are closely allied with the Scout program, by their purpose and aims. Kiwanis recognized National Newspaper Week at the meeting, and Publisher Jim Tapp of The Enterprise directed a few well-chosen remarks to the men, regarding the free press of our nation.

Kiwanian Pete Kobman is in charge of the program for Wednesday, October 16. Guest speaker on this occasion will be Joe Boite, who will speak on "Citizenship."

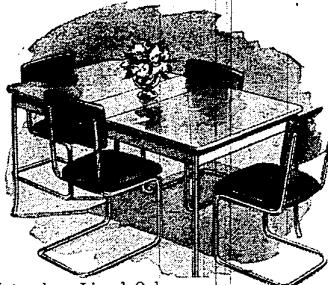

Public Invited To Hear Librarian

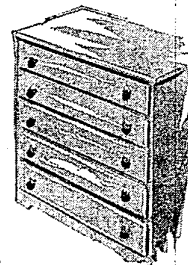
The Book Club will hold an open meeting next Sunday evening, October 13, at 8:00 p.m. at the First Methodist Church, Farmington.

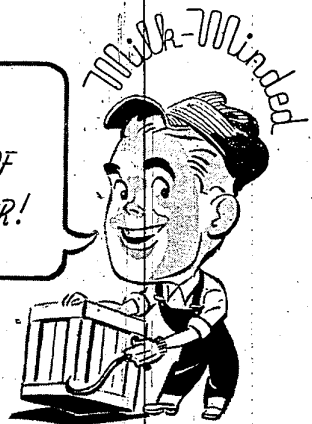
