To the Qualified Electors:

Notice is Hereby Given, That a General Election will be held in the Township of Farmington, State of Michigan, Precinct No. 1 at Farmington Town Hall, and Precinct No. 2 at Maccabee Hall, Clarenceville, within said Township on

**Tuesday, November 5, 1946**

For the Purpose of Electing the Following Officers, Viz:

STATE: Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, State Treasurer, Auditor General.

CONGRESSIONAL: United States Senator, Representative in Congress.

LEGISLATIVE: State Senator, Representative in State Legislature.

COUNTY: Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Auditor, Drain Commissioner, Coroners, County Surveyor, and such other Officers as are elected at that time.

### NON-PARTISAN ELECTION

For the Purpose of Electing the Following Officers, viz:

Justice of the Supreme Court (to fill vacancy) Circuit Court Commissioners

And to Vote on the Following Amendments:

1. Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Limiting State Control and Participation to Certain Internal Improvements.

2. Proposed Amendment to Article X of the Constitution by adding a New Section to be known as Number 23 to Provide for the Return of One Cent of the State Sales Tax to be divided among Cities, Villages, Townships and Schools, and to Provide for the Continuance of Annual School Grants.

3. Proposed Amendment to Article X of the State Constitution by adding thereto a New Section to stand as Section 23 Relative to Payments for Military Service in World War II.

NOTICE RELATIVE TO OPENING AND CLOSING OF THE POLLS: Election Law, Revision of 1943. (3939) Section 1. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continued open until 8 o'clock in the afternoon and no longer. The duties and problems of a veterinarian are better understood by members of the Farmington Kiwanis Club following their program last Wednesday evening. Kiwanian Jim Newlin presented his brother, Dr. Louis Newlin, who spoke on his work, telling of some of the cases he has encountered. Dr. Newlin showed the members various instruments, and explained how they were used.

He told of the limited research that has been done in the absence of a field, and how limited facilities are for education in this vocation. At the present time, he stated, there are over four times the number enrolled in veterinary school at Michigan State College, that can possibly hope to complete their education, due to the limits of the school.
