DUNKEL NAMED LOCAL DIRECTOR OF NAVY PROGRAM

O. E. Dunkel, Lt. Commander (Reserve) has been placed in charge of the Navy Volunteer Reserve (V-5) program for the Farmington area. It was announced this week.

Dunkel has been authorized to recruit and act as an information director for any young men interested in enlisting in the Navy Volunteer Reserves. The program is open to all veterans of the armed forces.

He pointed out that men serving in the Navy Volunteer Reserves are not required to report to their draft board while in the reserve status and that men are not subject to call except by consent or a national emergency.

Dunkel added that service in the reserve adds to longevity; the same as active service in the Navy. Men keep the highest rank or rating and have a chance for advancement.

No physical examinations are required for enrollment and employment in any civil branch of the public service, in civilian occupations including the practice of professions or occupations before or in connection with any department of the Federal Government may be accepted.

Dunkel also stated that men in the Reserve may request an annual 14 day cruise, however drills and cruises are not required.

Smooth Ice Cream
The smoothness of ice cream is directly related to the size of the air cells and ice crystals. Commercial equipment freezes so rapidly that only small air cells and ice crystals are formed. The home refrigerator in use today cannot freeze ice cream so rapidly, and larger crystals result; but the new-type refrigerator is expected to step up the freezing time and make smoother ice cream.

Cold Desserts
The most desirable temperature for serving cold desserts is from 45 to 50 degrees Fahrenheit, and it is much better to serve them colder and allow them to warm on the plate than to run the risk of allowing them to be eaten too warm. If the frozen fruit is to be used in frozen salad, ice cream, or in mixed frozen fruit dessert, the fruit may be handled throughout the frozen state, or while some ice remains in the tissue.
