### CIVIC ASSOCIATION CLARIFIES WATER SUPPLY SITUATION

On Tuesday evening, October 29, the Farmington Township Civic Association met at the Macabees Hall in Clarenceville for their monthly meeting.

Two letters were brought before the meeting, which will help to clarify the situation regarding the shortage of water in certain communities.

The first letter, under date of September 30, 1946, was directed to the Water Board of the City of Detroit, and read:

"Last week, September 24, 1946, a news item stating the immediate plans for the expenditure of several million dollars for extending water lines was brought to this Association's attention.

"Our Civic group is deeply concerned over the water situation in Farmington Township, Section 36. We would like to ask this question and await an immediate answer. Will the Township, Section 36, purchasers of water from the Detroit water system be benefited by this program?"

In answer to the Civic Association's question, came this reply, addressed to the Farmington Township Civic Association.

"In re: your letter of September 30 relative to certain improvements in the Detroit Water System, I beg to advise that all of this will be within the confines of the City of Detroit.

"There can be no permanent improvement in water supply conditions to Farmington Township until the water line is laid in Grand River Ave. from the City limits to Farmington Township. We have adequate supply lines and pressures at our city limits, but the systems beyond the city limits which are owned by Redford, Livonia, Southfield and Farmington Townships are inadequate to supply water in satisfactory quantities and pressures to the outlying areas, particularly during the summer months. We have proposed several methods of financing improvements without our City limits, of which your Township officials are aware. While they and Livonia Township officials are agreeable to proceeding, I beg to say that Southfield Townships would join and hence the matter was dropped.

"When there is a unified and coordinated effort made by these Townships to help themselves, then only will there be adequate quantities and pressures to the areas affected.

It is hoped, that through publication of these two letters, the people of the affected areas will understand just why the whole matter was dropped, at least for the time being.

It was decided to hold the next meeting of the Civic Association at Gramers Hall at Eleven Mile and Inkster Roads on November 26. Everyone is welcome to attend, and bring a friend or neighbor, if you can. This is your community, and only with unified support can it be improved.
