**OAKLAND COUNTY
RED CROSS NOTES**

Community Service to Camps and Hospitals committee of the Oakland County Chapter American Red Cross has accepted a quota of 1500 Christmas boxes for patients at Percy Jones Hospital, Battle Creek. The committee is hoping through the assistance of individuals and organizations of Oakland County to make this one of the best Christmas seasons for the 5000 patients at the hospital. Many of the patients have spent months in bed and a number of them will remain in the hospital many more months before returning to civilian life. The committee is anxious to secure Christmas packages by Dec. 6 and suggests that the values should be between three and four dollars.

Contents may be: Pen and pencil sets, cigarette lighters, bill folds, shaving sets, cigarette cases, writing kits, pipes, tobacco, key cases, picture frames, brush sets, clothing brushes, ties, handkerchiefs, T shirts, olive drab socks, scarfs, gloves, shoe shining kits, toilet article cases, tobacco pouches, cameras, poker chips and shaving mirrors.

Items which should be avoided are: Crossword puzzles, jigsaw puzzles, scrap books, perishables, liquor and any second-hand items. Gifts should be attractively wrapped and labeled with a removable label on the outside specifying the contents. Individuals and organizations are requested to call Mrs. Walter Appel, Pontiac 5689 if they are planning to prepare gifts, in order that notification may be given of where the gifts will be received. 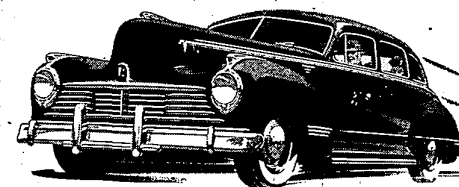
