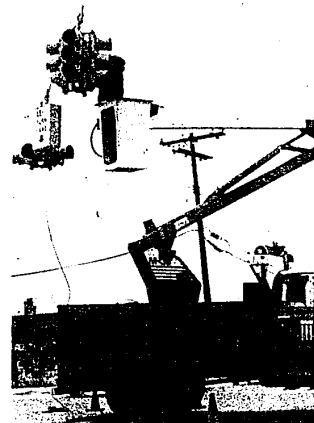
WOMEN'S SLOW PITCH

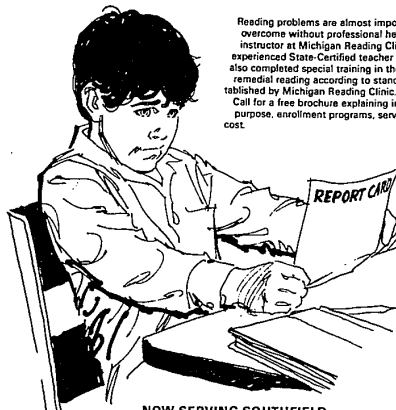
