Rural Sudanese Follow Region's Water Supply

Unevenly spread over the Egyptian Sudan, following the Nile, the water supply, are six and a half million people of different races, religions and customs. Modern Arabs are found chiefly in the north, while pagan Negroes live mostly in the south—with various mixtures in between.

For the most part rural Sudanese lead simple agricultural, nomadic, or semi-nomadic lives. A few subsistence crops are planted during summer rains and kept alive by irrigation. Cattle, camels, horses, sheep and goats are raised. Cotton is the leading cash-crop. Production has been increased by improved varieties and by extensive irrigation. This country is the world's major source of gum arabic, used in pharmaceuticals, confectionery, inks and adhesives. Ivory, salt and gold are other important products.

Khartoum, the capital, is a city of palm groves and flower gardens situated where the Blue and White arms of the Nile meet. It is the world's largest model of colonial building, with handsome government structures, clubs and homes, and wide paved streets. In World War II it became an air base and overland transport center for Allied equipment and men.

Shipboard Gossip

In it, reports a ship magazine, was Jack Tar's most precious commodity — fresh water. As a respite from their labors, sailing men headed for the water butt and its copious scuttle, or dipper. Gone now is the cask and armed sailor who stood guard beside it to make sure no water was wasted. In World War II it became inside Jack. But the word, as a synonym for gossip or rumor, lives on in our modern-day language.

VETERAN NEWS

TOTAL DISABILITY BENEFITS OFFERED UNDER NSLI
 Veterans who have National Service Life Insurance may be insured against total disability without reducing the face value of the policy if disability payments are received, according to the Veterans Administration.

VA said that veterans with service-connected disabilities less than total in degree are not prevented from taking advantage of the new provision, provided they apply for it before January 1, 1950. In these cases, such disabilities are waived if they are the only bar to meeting the health requirements.

Total disability income benefits authorized by recent legislation may be added to any plan of NSLI upon application, proof of good health, and payment of an extra premium. Premium rates for the disability coverage range from 6 cents to 94 cents a month per \$1,000 of insurance, depending on the insured's age and type of policy.

The disability benefits are at the rate of \$5 a month for each \$1,000 of insurance and are payable after the veteran has been totally disabled continuously for 6 months or more. The monthly benefits will continue to be paid as long as the insured remains totally disabled. However, the disability must commence before the veteran's 60th birthday.

In addition to the benefits for total disability which a veteran may receive from NSLI, he may also receive a pension for a non-service-connected permanent total disability providing his income is less than \$1,000 a year if single, or \$2,500 a year if married or a widower with minor children. Benefits received under NSLI are not included in computing income. The pension amounts to \$60 a month and automatically increases to \$72 for veterans who have been on the rolls 10 years or have reached the age of 65. However, veterans are eligible for pensions only if the disability is permanent, whereas they may receive insurance benefits if the disability is not permanent.
