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AID FOR THE HANDICAPPED IS CLUB TOPIC

Two representatives of The Goodwill Industries of Detroit presented the program to the Farmington Woman's Club, which met at the home of Mrs. Koute Brown, 33221 Shiloh Avenue, last Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. Brown, who worked with Goodwill Industries for a score of years, introduced Miss Edey, who explained the work and activities of The Industries. She stated that there are 93 units in the United States, such as the one in Detroit. The Detroit Industries are composed of the center, occupying a six-story building at the corner of Congress and Brush, and three other stores. The center provides training for production, service, health and safety for handicapped persons. Their staff includes an occupational therapist. The Detroit center runs \$3.00 per week, for 300 persons, with 250 persons now on the waiting list.

Miss Edey's talk was preceded by a soprano solo, "Nighty Night," sung by Miss Clara May Porter, switchboard operator at The Center of Goodwill Industries. Following the talk Miss Porter gave a telephone monologue, "Aunt A. Bell," read a poem, "Pleasant Happpiness," and sang "I'm Always Chasing Rainbows."

A goodly number of members and guests present were Mrs. Marcus Burrows and Mrs. F. E. Searle.

The special committee on the revision of the constitution reported, and the new constitution was adopted.
