**MEAT CUT Quiz**

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?  
A. This is a full-cut round steak of beef. It is sometimes divided in two parts and sold as top round steak and bottom round steak.  
Q. Where does the cut come from, and how is it identified?  
A. The round steak is cut from the round of beef. It is round or oval in shape, with a small round bone. It has one large muscle (sometimes sold separately as top round steak) and three smaller muscles. The whole steak has more lean to the amount of bone and fat than other beef steaks.  
Q. How should this cut be prepared?  
A. Beef round steak is best cooked by broiling. It is ideal for Swiss steak or any of its many variations. The whole steak may be rolled around a stuffing, or it may be cut into individual servings, and then stuffed to make Beef Birds. Round steak is also prepared as Country Fried Steak.

"Seeing" the Invisible  
Although nobody has ever seen an atom it is possible for the human eye to learn a lot about atoms through ingenious optical and other instruments, according to the Better Vision Institute. Microscopes magnify objects up to about 4,000 diameters, making visible bacteria and other things which the naked eye cannot see. However, to see atoms would require a microscope a billion times more powerful. Shadow pictures of atoms can be obtained by the use of x-rays with the spectroscopic, thus providing information about the arrangement of atoms in various substances. Molecular groups of atoms in rubber, for example, seem to stretch out in long strings, expanding and contracting like coiled springs.

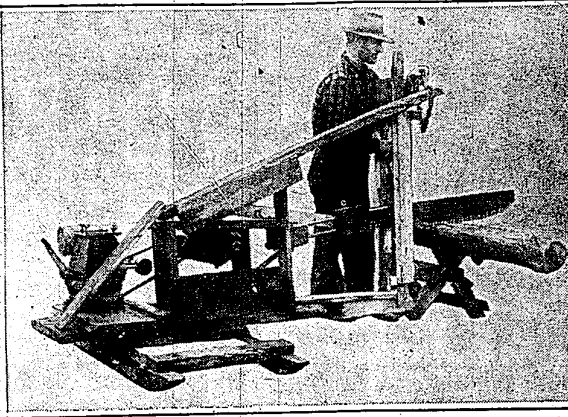

## Portable Power Drag Saw



By using his portable power drag saw, George Stacey, of Riverdale, Mich., illustrates the labor-saving being attained by the Emergency Farm Labor program of the Michigan State college extension service. Stacey can cut three cords of wood while splitting and piling two and tending his saw. The saw consists of two skid shape runners with a large plank attached with a bolt in a fifth wheel fashion. On the plank turn table are mounted a gasoline engine, an old washing machine gear case, and the log. The saw cut with guides which slide on two short lengths of one-half inch pipe. In order that the log be kept from being on hand when the block is cut out, the chain within the uprights is adjusted to a hook to tend the saw from dropping to the ground at the end of each cut.

**Agronomists Develop Control for Nematodes**  
Swapping a quarter's worth of chemical for 400 pounds of ripe watermelon seems to be a good trade but that is what happened in an experiment at Tifton, Ga., where department of agriculture scientists are co-operating with state experiment station workers in finding the best ways of coping with root-knot nematodes.

Many of the soils in the coastal plain are infested by the nematodes that cause root knot. Some of these soils are desirable for watermelon growing. The nematodes, however, show somewhat the same partiality for roots of watermelon that two-legged animals have for fruits of the vine. When the nemas eat the roots, the melons do not grow so well.

Chlorophenol treatment will kill the nematodes, but the chemical plus labor for applying it is expensive. The experimenters found it practical to treat only the hills or spots where the melon seeds would be planted. The result was that the treatment cost was cut to about \$5 an acre. A treated hill grew 450 pounds of salable melons while an untreated hill the nemas allowed a harvest of only 175 pounds of salable melons. In the end, it was estimated that for six and one-half cents for chlorophenol treatment—and no more expense and labor of cultivation—a grower could bring in an additional 100 pounds of watermelons.
