If there is some provision that any Township voter feels is unfair or unjust, or if there is something they feel is not adequately covered by the ordinance, this is the time to voice any objections or offer any comments.

The zoning board has spent a great deal of time and study on the ordinance, doing considerable research and survey work before making any attempt to compile the information into ordinance form. The board has conscientiously undertaken this assignment and have put forth their best effort, but they invite any comments or criticisms residents may have.
