Dairymen To Hold Herd Health Meets

A series of dairy herd health educational meetings will be held in Oakland County throughout March. The program, sponsored by the Extension Service Dairy Planning Committee, will be aimed at the prevention of Bangs and Mastitis diseases.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Planning Committee, a subcommittee composed of Keith Middleton of Lake Orion; Kenneth Rocker, Wilcox; James Reid, Farmington; Cyril Oliver, Pontiac; William Edgar, Clarkston and John Rees, Holly, was given the responsibility of drawing up a project covering control and prevention of these diseases.

Recommendations of the committee were to conduct a series of educational meetings in various sections of the county. The suggestion was made that local veterinarians be enlisted to help with the meetings which would be aimed at teaching farmers to recognize these diseases, and practices to take to prevent or eliminate serious outbreaks in their herds. Tentative plans were made to hold meetings in Wilcox, Davisburg and Oxford.

R. W. Alchin, Assistant County Agent in charge of the project, points out that an average of about 20 percent of the productive capacity of herds in the county is lost because of Bangs disease and Mastitis. Mr. Alchin says that up to 30 percent of the production capacity in some herds in Oakland County has been lost, and that prevention of the disease is a step for better security for dairymen in the county.

CULLING OF FLOCK A CONSTANT JOB FOR BEST RESULTS

Culling of the laying flock is not a once or twice a year job according to Karl D. Bailey, county agricultural agent. Culling of hens in a laying house should be a constant job and should begin with the flock owner paying particular attention to lazy, inactive or unthrifty laying birds.

"Every hen consumes an average of eight pounds of feed a month. At the present price of feed, that means it costs a hen in feed alone — 25 cents a month to keep a hen around. If she doesn't produce a dozen eggs or more a month, you're better off if she becomes a chicken and dumplings for some Sunday dinner," Mr. Bailey suggests.

One of the easiest ways to cull your flock is to go quietly into the laying house at night while the hens are at roost. With a flashlight look them over. When you find a hen with a dull dry or shriveled comb, a yellow looking face, a dry vent, a hard fleshy abdomen, and a yellow instead of white bill, you can usually figure her out as a "sourder."

The ones you pick out as culls, may easily be placed in a separate pen for a few days as a check against your first decision. If you don't find them producing, you can be sure your first opinion was correct.

It is always good poultry management to cull your laying flock and quit feeding the hens that are not producing. And if you are not averaging more than 50 percent production, Mr. Bailey believes your flock is due for some careful culling.

MAY PLANT MORE BARLEY IN STATE

Growers of barley last year were encouraged by the best yields in several years and indications show that the Michigan Barley acreage may be increased this year. This is the belief of Roy E. Decker, head of the department of farm crops at Michigan State college.

Barley has long been recognized as an excellent companion crop for seedlings of alfalfa. Decker, in fact, says that a 40-bushel yield of barley is equal to that of approximately a 58 bushel per acre crop of oats.

This year, a better maturing barley contest is being conducted in the 10 leading barley counties of Michigan.

FARM FEATURES**One-Man Orchard Sprayer**

On the W. G. Mawby fruit farm, Grand Rapids, Forrest Graham operates a one-man spray gun which enables him to do work formerly requiring two operators.

In operation, direction of the spray gun is changed merely by a forward, rearward, or rotational pressure on an auto steering wheel within easy reach of the tractor controls. A foot valve controls the spray mixture from the pressure spray tank drawn by the tractor.

Since this device will spray from either side, advantage can be taken of wind direction. Farm labor specialists of the Michigan State college extension service recommend the spray gun because one man can do the spraying in young orchards. In older orchards, lower parts of a tree can be sprayed in this manner with a man on the tank lower to spray the tops.

Farm Labor Needs Critical In County

The need for farm help is as critical in Oakland County as it has been the last three years, states Harley Abbott, Emergency Farm Labor Assistant.
