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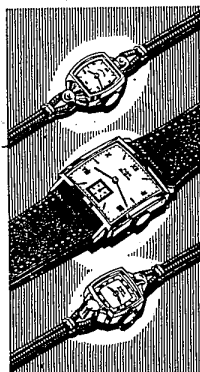
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Growers Hold Annual Meeting

About one hundred farmers and fruit growers attended the second annual banquet of the Southern Michigan Cooperative Growers Association held at the Salem Evangelical Church in Farmington last Thursday evening, March 8.

A fine program of music was furnished by Conroy's Orchestra, and Charles Gronlund gave several selections on the marimba. Henry Bogdan of St. Mary's of Orchard Lake entertained with his accordion. Robert Peabody of Birmingham acted as Master of Ceremonies. A. B. Love, State Supervisor of Emergency Farm Labor, East Lansing, spoke on the farm labor situation for 1947. He stated that plans were under way for the use of migrant labor in this area and that information and reception centers would be set up in Michigan to direct labor where it is most needed. He suggested that growers have some inducement if they expected this labor to return from year to year. He particularly urged better employee-employer relations, better housing and cooperation of the general public, making the migrants feel more at home.

Mr. Love stated that to harvest the crops of Michigan, which include sugar beets, snap beans, peaches, potatoes, apples, peaches, pears, plums and cherries, we need 50,000 workers, 25,000 of this number being native labor according to these figures Michigan would need 25,000 workers from outside. W. K. Von Weller, Attaché of the Dutch Consulate in Detroit, showed two films on Holland—one film entitled "Holland Carries On" and the other, "Tulips Flower Again".
