LEGISLATION TO LIBERALIZE NSLI

Legislation was signed by President Truman last week to further liberalize the National Service Life Insurance Act for some ten million World War II veterans who have allowed their term policies to lapse. The new law gives the Administration authority to determine the conditions of reinstatement by administrative regulations.

General Omar N. Bradley, VA Administrator, immediately announced that veterans who have allowed their NSLI policies to lapse at any time in the past may be reinstated without taking a physical examination provided they are in an good health as they were in the time of lapse, and provided they make two monthly premium payments.

These liberal reinstatement provisions will remain in effect until August 1, 1947. Also, under the new law, a veteran may obtain any permanent NSLI plan without previously having held a term insurance policy. Under the old law, VA was required to issue NSLI originally on a term plan only, and it could not be converted to a permanent plan type until one year after the policy was first taken out.

The new act provides, in certain cases, for automatic waiver of term insurance to a permanent plan if the policy holder is totally disabled. Under the old law, if he failed to convert within the term period, protection ceased. All NSLI policies provided for a waiver of premiums for veterans who become totally disabled for six or more consecutive months. Even though premiums are being waived, these veterans can convert their term policies to all types of permanent insurance, except the endowment plan type. The premium will be waived during the continuance of the total disability.

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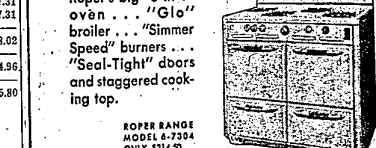
