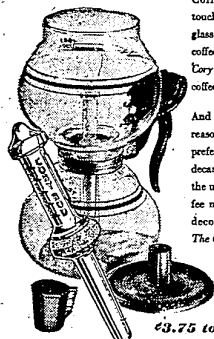

## PASSION WEEK SERVICE PLANNED AT CLARENCEVILLE

The Clarenceville Methodist Church of which Elsie A. Johns is pastor, extends a hearty invitation to worship with the congregation during Passion Week.

On Palm Sunday, Sunday School will be held at 10:00 a.m. with morning worship at 11:15 a.m. Appropriate music will be provided by the choir directed by Miss Margaret Tremblor, and there will be baptismal service. Rev. Johns will preach on "The Coming of the King."

Senior and Intermediate Youth Fellowships will meet at 6:30 p.m. Evening worship will be held at 7:30 p.m. This will be a Cross center service with the congregation singing the old familiar hymns of the Church, centering around the Cross.

The pastor will begin a series of sermons, "The Voice from the Cross." ## Citizen Protests Airport Location

The Enterprise is in receipt of another protest from a resident of the Orchard Lake-Bond School area regarding Kristof airport.

The letter, signed by Mr. Rudolph Leidig, was prompted following the discussion at the Township Board meeting over the location of a tavern in that area. Mr. Leidig stated that "people living between Orchard Lake Road, North-western Highway, Eleven and Twelve Mile Roads, certainly would be surprised to hear our neighborhood described as a nice residential section by Mr. Howard Bond, attorney opposing the location of the tavern in our area." This is in view of the fact that the airport is located on ground formerly owned by Mr. Isaac Bond, Leidig added. He continued, "If anything tends to bring down property values it is an airport."

"Mr. Bond is well aware of the attitude of his neighbors towards the airport," Leidig added. He stated, "I believe many people would sooner see six saloons than one airport."

changes for the numbering system will increase the number of codes from 85 to more than 500. Lucy said the necessity of taking care of growth in Detroit would not in itself require such universal number changes. "We must get Detroit and suburban communities ready, however, for suburban and nationwide toll dialing," he explained.

"The prospective number changes," Lucy continued, "probably all would have been made, perhaps on a more gradual basis, had not the war interfered with our expansion and development plans. If Detroit and nearby exchanges are to be recorded the advantages of these two new developments in the telephone art, the necessary number changes must get under way at this time in order that they be made on a gradual and orderly basis."
