

Billboard Law Gets More Local Support

LANSING Sens. David Plawecki (D-Dearborn Heights) and Daniel Cooper (D-Oak Park) voted for the final version of billboard control law last week after opposing a weaker version that passed the Senate in January.

The final vote also drew support from Sen. William Faust (D-Westland), who was absent for the January vote, and from Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) totaling 31-0.

House support came from all but two Observerland representatives, James Defenbaugh (R-Birmingham), who voted against it, and Rep. Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park), who did not vote.

Favoring it in the 56-32 vote were Rep. Richard Young (D-Dearborn Heights), John Bennett (D-Redford Township), Marvin Stempion (D-Livonia), James Tierney (D-Garden City),

Thomas Brown (D-Westland) and Raymond Baker (R-Farmington). All had voted for it previously except Tierney, who was ill at that time.

THOUGH slightly stronger than the original Senate version and weaker than the first House version, the bill gives cities, villages, counties and charter townships with populations over 50,000 power to regulate billboards by ordinance provided it doesn't conflict with state law.

In Observerland it means that Westland, Livonia and Southfield can regulate the size, lighting and spacing of billboards as long as they don't conflict with the state regulations.

Local governments who currently ban billboards can maintain their ban.

THE BILL cleared the House in time to save the state \$19.6 million in federal highway money which would have been lost if state guidelines were not brought into harmony with federal regulations.

It will permit up to 50 billboards per mile on highways inside city limits, up to 17 per mile on business routes outside city limits and a maximum of 10 per mile along interstate highways and freeways.

Permits must be obtained for each billboard and serial numbers given. Those signs unnumbered four months after the law takes effect will be considered abandoned and be removed.

It is estimated that the legislation could lead to removal of more than half of the 33,000 billboards along interstate and federal highways.

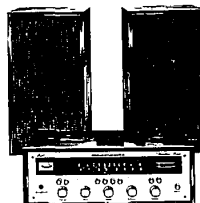
