She was born in Detroit, Michigan, but has lived in Jacksonville, Florida; Kansas City, Kansas; Ypsilanti, Michigan, and was graduated from Highland Park High School. She was a science major at the Highland Park Junior College for two years. Following that, she took a six-month course at the Grace Hospital Training School in order to become a laboratory technician. After doing office and laboratory work at Grace Hospital and Sheppard Sanitarium, where her mother, who is a doctor, was superintendent, Michigan State Normal was her next objective. Here she majored in natural sciences and minored in chemistry for two years and received her B. S. degree and a teachers' life certificate. For the two years preceding, she belonged to the Phi Kappa Debate Club and another group which toured Michigan and put on one-act plays for the P. T. A.'s in Washtenaw County.

Then, Miss Sheppard hopped into her automobile and drove out to California. There she sold her car and took the bus home by way of Oregon, Montana, and Washington. After arriving home, she took the real estate examination and opened her own real estate office, known as the Detroit Century Realty Company. Not altogether satisfied with teaching and her real estate business, she took up aerial photography and air navigation at the University of Michigan. Her next venture was at the University of Chicago, where she did graduate work from trying to chemistry in schools in Eugene, Oregon; Centerville, Michigan, and Diamonddale, located near Lansing.

Her hobby is photography and she has a 16 millimeter movie camera, which she carries with her almost every place she goes. You'd have to go some before you could beat Miss Mary Louise Sheppard. Don't you agree that she is "quite a gal"? M. T.

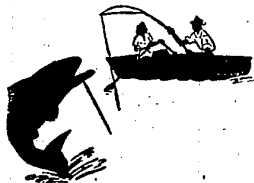

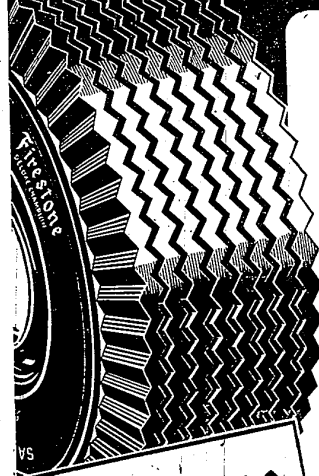
