#### Board Adopts Salary Schedule

The Board of Education of the Clarenceville School District in spe-cial session Monday evening, ap-proved a teachers salary schedule

Superintendent M. J. Beiser stat ed that the schedule is based on a ed that the schedule is based on a percentage of General Fund receipts. The amount platd each teacher is determined by his or her experience in the Clareneville schools plus amount of education. Under this neckedule minimum salarles for two year life certificates will be raised from \$1500 last year to \$2500 for the year 1947-48. Maximum salarles will be increased from \$2,000 last year to \$3,950 this coming year for male teachers with

coming year for male teachers wit Master Degrees.

In addition to these increases for next year, Belser stated that the Board will give teachers and other school employees whatever funds are left at the end of the fiscal year over and above the cash on hand as of July 1, 1946. Teachers in the Clarenceville schools were given a \$200 raise last year. Belser added, instead of the usual \$100. Under the adopted schodule the average teacher salary in Clarenceville will be \$2,540.

All full time employees of the Clarenceville schools except the Superintendent, Clerks, and Custodinus are on the schedule. Two weeks vacation with pay has been granted to all employees on a full twelve months basis.
