Registration by Affidavit
Any absent voter whose name is not registered and who shall claim the right to vote by Absent Voter's Ballot at any Election or Special Election, may at the time of making application for Absent Voter's Ballot, present to the Secretary of the Board of Education, an affidavit for registration which is worded in proper form.

Registration of Absentee by Oath
If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any annual election or special election, and shall, under oath, state that he is a resident of such precinct and has resided in the school district the required length of time next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his residence, and that he possesses the other qualifications of an elector under the constitution, and that, owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself or some other member of his family, or owing to his absence from the school district on public business or his own business and without intent to avoid or delay his registration, he was unable to make application for registration on the last two days provided by law for the registering of electors preceding such election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he shall then be permitted to vote at such election. If such applicant shall, in said matter wilfully make any false statement, he shall be deemed guilty of perjury.
