

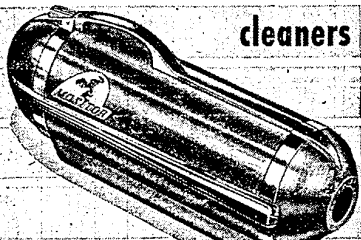
Farm Ponds

**How About
