Airmarkers Completed
In Farmington, Novi

Farmington and Novi were among
the twenty-five towns which were
being airmarked so far this sum-
mer, reported Walter J. Carr, air-
marking specialist of the Mi-
chigan Department of Aeronautics.

The airmark project calls for a
total of 500 towns to be identified
with the aid of signs. Farmington's
airmark is located at Nowell's Ford
Agency, Grand River and Oak-
land Roads. The signs, painted
yellow on large flat buildings in
each town with letters 10 feet high,
easily visible to pilots at an altitude
of 5000 feet have also been com-
pleted in Charlevoix, Olivet, Mar-
shall, Lawton, Mattawan, Bloom-
ingdale, Nottawa, Schoolcraft, Por-
tage, Three Rivers, Merceus, Plain-
well, Otsego, Williamston, Webber-
ville, Mt. Pleasant, Leland, Fowl-
erville, Brighton, Lansing Airport,
Detroit City Airport, at the corner
of Grand River and Eight Mile
Roads, and two signs at Climax,
one marking the Battle Creek Air-
port and the other a Kalamazoo
Airport sign.

During the 1946 season, when the
post war airmarking was begun,
185 towns were marked. Prior to
the war 461 towns had been mark-
ed but the signs had to be obliterated
after security measures. The Michigan
Department of Aeronautics
has been furnishing the paint
and in many instances the labor
for the job. For painting work
and inability to obtain paint
were attributed by Carr to be re-
tarding the program this season.

Grinnell Named President
Of Rural Safety Council

The Michigan Rural Safety Coun-
cil, formed recently at Michigan
State college, has named as pres-
ident, Milton Grinnell, editor of the
Michigan Farmer magazine.

Organization of the council was
sponsored by the Michigan State
college extension specialist in agri-
cultural engineering, and in charge
of the HSC farm safety and fire
prevention program, was named
secretary. The executive committee
is composed of L. P. Diefel, sec-
retary of the state-association of
Mutual Insurance companies, E.
E. Ungren, public relations head
for Michigan Farm Bureau, and S.
L. Larsen, secretary of the Michi-
gan Farm Equipment association.

The council has as its purpose
a year-around safety program for
Michigan farms. At present it is
working on an educational program
for National Farm Safety Week,
July 20 to 26, 1947.

Hybrid Corn
In 1945 more than 58 million acres
were planted to hybrid corn vari-
eties, according to the department
of agriculture. Since 1938, when 15
per cent of the corn acreage was
planted to hybrids, there has been
an increase each year of from 8.7
per cent to 8.6 per cent, or close to
7 million acres. In the corn belt
states, hybrids are estimated to
have increased yield at least 20
per cent over the open-pollinated
varieties.

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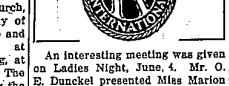
