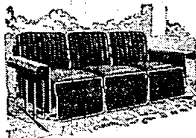


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Return To Clarenceville Church

Mrs. James Layn spent the week end with her cousin, Mrs. Helen Connelley in Detroit.

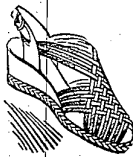

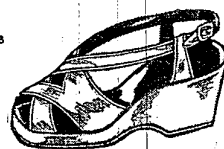

Shortages Halt Erection of Signs

Work on the erection of no parking signs and the painting of the pavement at the main intersection of Grand River and Farmington Road has temporarily been stopped, Police Commissioner Kena Loomis stated Wednesday, because of the necessity of working on the streets.

A number of Farmington's streets are now being repaired and hard topped requiring the time of the city employees that were working on the signs. In addition Loomis stated that they have not as yet received enough signs and sign posts to complete the job. They have been ordered and are expected to arrive soon.

A survey has been made by the State Highway Department of the main intersection of Grand River and Farmington Road and blue prints are being prepared. They will contain the proper specifications for the marking of turns and cross walks on the pavement. Loomis stated that as soon as the intersection could be cleaned, the painting of the turns and crosswalks would begin.

However, during the past week a number of no parking signs have been erected in open alleys, and Thomas Street and beside the Enterprise Office. In addition approximately 15 sign posts have been erected in the City and will be replaced as soon as the signs arrive.

Repair work is being done on Brookdale, Shawassaw and Power Avenues. Inclement weather has been holding up work on the resurfacing of these streets. However, considerable work has been accomplished over the past week.

William Fitzpatrick Services for Mr. William Fitzpatrick, beloved father of Mrs. Marion C. Nelson, with whom he made his home the past few years and at whose home he passed away June 6, were held at St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Hancock, Michigan. Interment was made in Mt. Calvary Cemetery, Lake Linden, Michigan, beside his wife, who preceded him in death 29 years ago. Born in Hancock, Michigan, August 18, 1883, Mr. Fitzpatrick spent sixty years of his life in the Copper Country, later moving to Chicago, and then to Farmington.

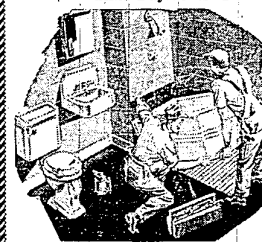
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
