Cows Drink Freely
Cows drink more water and give more milk and butterfat when allowed to drink at will. In a test where cows were allowed to drink at will they drank approximately 18 per cent more water and yielded nearly 11 per cent more butterfat than they did when they were watered but twice a day. When the cows had water early accessible, each of them drank on an average about 10 times in 24 hours. About two-thirds of the water was consumed between 5 a. m. and 8 p. m. and the other third during the night.

Following the ancient custom, the Princess before signing the Freeman's Declaration, gave her promise to be "good and true to our sovereign lord, King George VI and to be obedient to the Mayor of this city." This alluded to the custom demanding that the members of the Royal Family ask the Lord Mayor's permission to drive through the city. Princess Elizabeth was the youngest Freeman on the city's rolls and the second woman ever to be given such a ceremony. The first was Baroness Burdett-Coutts.

The Varbels visited Mr. and Mrs. Paul Smith in Redford Saturday evening.

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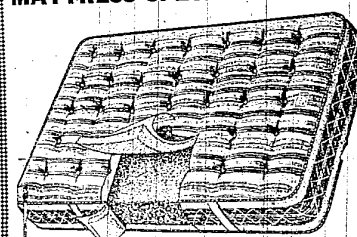
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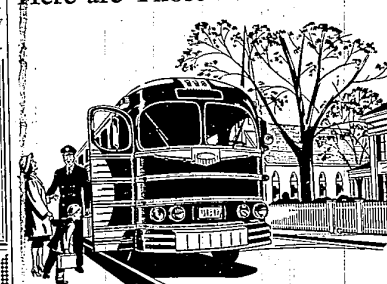

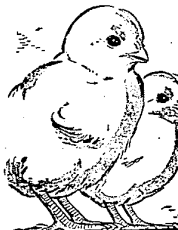
