



After the reception, which was held at Merrie Hill Hall, the couple left for a trip to Saint Louis, Mo.




Mr. and Mrs. David Edwards of Parker Avenue are the proud parents of a ten and a half pound daughter, born June 24 at Pontiac General Hospital.


