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RED CROSS TO FORM EMERGENCY PLAN

Marshall Smith, Chairman of the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, announces that a Disaster Institute will be held in Oakland County July 22nd and 23rd under V. A. Phillips, Red Cross State Relations Officer. Mr. Phillips will meet with Chairmen of Subcommittees in order to form a preparedness plan which would operate in event of an emergency. Monthly reports of Red Cross disaster operations show that no part of the nation is immune from disaster. In Michigan alone, during the month of April, 3,655 families suffered loss; the Red Cross operated 22 shelters; 2,293 homes were damaged. Included in a recent monthly report are disasters in 23 states.

The Congressional Charter of the American Red Cross obligates Red Cross Chapters to assume authority and responsibility for the relief of people suffering in time of disaster. Families and individuals are assisted to the extent that their needs are disaster caused and cannot be met by the families themselves.

Mrs. Fred Bagnall is Chairman of Disaster in Farmington.

The two chapter offices located at 53 1/2 W. Huron Street, Pontiac, and 321 W. Sixth Street, Royal Oak, will be closed all day Saturday during July and August, except for the Marshall Smith, Chapter Chairman. Staff members can be located however, for emergency calls, through the emergency telephone number, 4-1362.
