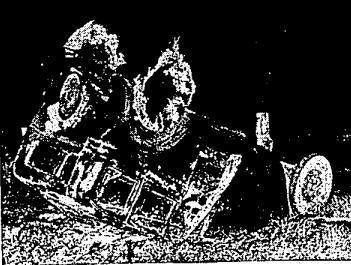

IMPROPER PASSING MAY MEAN DEATH



A driver who was not breaking any law, and two passengers with him, burned to death in this inferno when a reckless overtaking maneuver turned into the gasoline tank, setting it off, and the car was knocked off the road, and over and over into a field, where it quickly turned into a molten furnace. The luckless driver himself was not injured — such is the irony of highway accidents. National Conservation Bureau safety specialists report that improper passing ranked fifth as a cause of motor vehicle deaths last year; most often it was combined with excessive speed which accounted for at least 8,000 fatalities.



ON CAPITOL HILL

News and Comment from Congressmen
George A. Dondero

Shortcomings of the War Department: Congressman George A. Dondero, speaking in reference to our national security, in the House of Representatives, stated: "Fitness of a Cabinet officer in this troubled day is found in his ability to fathom the wiles of the international Communist conspiracy and his ability to counteract these measures by his own efforts and that of competent personnel. It is with regret that I am forced to the conclusion that Secretary of War Patterson falls short of these standards."

Early in the year, when it was announced that General MacArthur had refused permission for the Communist-dominated World Federation of Trade Unions representatives to visit Korea and Japan, and Secretary of War Patterson had, on March 17, 1947, called attention to the danger of sending a man with Louis M. Sallan's record of close cooperation with the French Communists to Japan. His warning contained these words: "I serve notice upon Secretary Patterson that he will be held directly responsible for any difficulties created. Trouble did arise in Korea, as you will remember."

Congressman Dondero pointed out many instances where the Secretary of War has surrounded himself and made appointments as advisers to our Commanders in Charge in Germany and Japan of people who have known communist leanings, and who have been in positions high in the courts of that party. He has not hesitated to call them by name and to establish a record of such activities. He called attention to the fact that:

"The War Department has produced a film entitled 'Scots of Duty', which is being widely shown by Communist organizations throughout the country and for very good reason. The film is replete with the Communist-promoted hatred for the German people, along the lines of the discredited Morgenthau policy. I would like to know who is responsible for producing and approving this film, which is certainly not in accord with the present policy of the United States."

"We are today in such a critical state that every one of us, especially members of the Cabinet, and even more especially the Secretary of War, should at all times be on the alert to protect this country from its insidious enemies. I would not be an American if I did not call attention to these shortcomings, which in my opinion endanger our national security."

Europe's credit base. According to the Pathfinder Magazine, a sure sign of how bad Europe's credit is can be found in foreign nations' failure to pay the interest on American-held securities. Of some \$4.6 billion of foreign bonds, owned by American individuals and institutions, interest payments on more than half are in default.

Tax Reduction Bill: The Tax Reduction Bill (H.R. 3359) again passes both Houses of Congress, with a change in the date when it will become effective (January 1, 1948). Chairman Millikin (R-Colo.) of the Finance Committee of the Senate pointed out that the bill would cost only \$1.5 billion in fiscal 1948 (fiscal year July 1, 1947-June 30, 1948) because it would apply only to half year. He said Congress would probably reduce government expenditures by at least \$3 billion and that with a prospective government income of \$41.4 billion, there should be a surplus of \$5.9 billion in fiscal 1948 to apply to tax relief and the debt. HOWEVER THE PRESIDENT has served notice that he will veto the bill.

Existing Immigration Laws: Congressman Gossett (D-Texas) gives us some interesting facts in reference to immigration: "Of the immigrants coming here last year, not over one per cent went to the farms. At least 95 per cent poured into our big and overcrowded cities. Unemployment, housing, slums, disease, crime, education, health, and all of our many social, political, and economic problems are further complicated and aggravated by today's immigration. From Europe generally, we permit the entry of 151,000 a year under quotas. We impose no quotas whatsoever on

countries of the Western Hemisphere. Even from quota countries we permit many to come over above the 104,000; wives and minor children of American citizens, ministers, professors, and certain classes of merchant seamen may come in outside the quotas. Furthermore, during the war we naturalized 110,000 aliens serving in the American Army. We brought in 100,000 war brides. Under other existing laws we will probably receive into this country, through various channels, not less than two or three hundred thousand immigrants per year — more than we can adequately assimilate."

Civilian Government Employees: To show how the number of employees on the government payrolls have increased since 1930, I submit the following figures as compiled by the Committee for Constitutional Government, Inc. Federal jobholders in 1930, 644,000; in 1940, 1,068,000; 1947, 1,966,000. Families in United States in 1930, 29,905,000; 1940, 34,949,000;
