Howard Warner made a motion that the \$3,000 certificate of indebtedness on deposit at the Farmington State Bank be transferred to the Building and Site Fund. This total was deposited in a bank to cover bonds not submitted for refund. The motion was seconded by Domes and carried.

trict and warned that some areas may have to go to half day sessions, because of lack of adequate space. He concluded by stating that this problem can only be solved through the interest and cooperation of the entire district.

Following Superintendent Dunkel's talk, Gerald Domes and Fred Wilkinson, candidates for the school board, discussed two topic questions, "What do you intend to do about overcrowding in our schools?" and "How will you try to improve the working conditions, salaries and qualifications of our teaching staff?" Letters were read from Ray Eichler and Carl Matz, the two other candidates for the school board who were unable to attend the meeting.

Fred Bagnall, city commissioner, gave a brief talk on the anticipated expansion of the city, as it affects the schools. He stressed the importance of careful planning for future needs.
