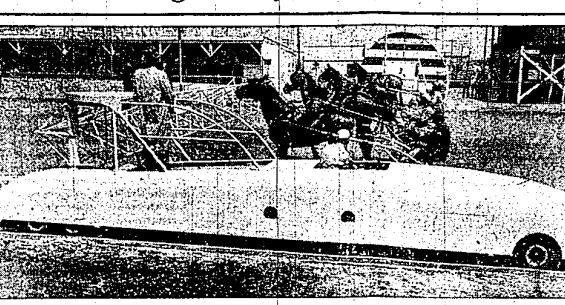

**LATEST WORD IN JACKET BLURB** The following new books may be obtained at your library located in the Farmington Town Hall.

"Strange and Fantastic Stories" by Margolies represents the secret pastime of a bookseller's lifetime.

The head buyer for a large metropolitan bookstore, the editor has started literally millions of books of all kinds on their mysterious circulation. The fifty selections were chosen from over five hundred outstanding stories over a period of many years. Here are some of the titles: "The Middle Toe of the Right Foot", "The Ancient Sin", "The Brute", "The Three Imps", "The Shorty", "The Fortune of Hope", "The Victim", "The Romance of Certain Old Clothes", and "Desire".

"Our Trees" by Emerson and Weed is a book to afford an opportunity for a more intelligent acquaintance with American trees, native and naturalized. The pictures have been photographed from nature, and have been brought to order in such a way that the non-botanical reader can recognize at a glance either the whole tree or the leaves, flowers, fruits, or winter twigs, and thus be able to identify any unknown tree.

The relative usefulness of important species for street, garden, small parks and woodland planting is also given.

"Balzac" by Zweig was written at the time of the author's death. The literary world was shocked when news reached them in 1942 that Stephan Zweig had taken his life. The biography of Honore Balzac was entrusted to a friend who edited and published the book posthumously.

## MICHIGAN BELL ASKS FOR GENERAL RATE INCREASE

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company formally announced its intention to file a petition with the Michigan Public Service Commission for a general rate increase.

Pointing out that it will mark the first time in 21 years that the company has sought a general increase in its charges, President Thomas N. Lacy declared that "pre-war rates are no longer enough to meet postwar costs."

Beyond the indication that "as a matter of fairness to all our customers," the proposed increases will be applied to all types of telephone service, Lacy did not reveal the extent of the proposed rate boosts. In accordance with the statute, the company will advertise its specific proposals during the week of August 3, preliminary to the filing of its petition with the Michigan Public Service Commission, later that month for approval.

"Michigan Bell today is operating under a general rate schedule established by the Commission in 1926," Lacy continued. "Except in towns where local rates have been lowered still further and for toll-rate reductions, the rates of ten years ago are still in effect. Meanwhile, the cost of everything used in furnishing telephone service—wages, taxes and supplies—has gone up."

"Postwar wage increases alone, for example, have raised Michigan Bell costs nearly \$11,000,000 a year," Lacy said.

"Although the amount of business that we have been doing has risen sharply, the increased income has not kept pace with the rapid upsurge in movement in costs. Since 1937, our income has gone up 2 1/2 times, but the cost of operating the business has risen three times the level of 10 years ago."

"As a result, our return on investment has slipped far below the danger mark. Based on today's telephone rates, the company's return now is only 4 1/2 cents on the investment dollar—a drop of more than one-third under the rate of return in 1937. If new rates ordered by the Commission in 1946 were being charged today, the return would be even lower—actually less than 3 1/2 per cent. That rate order is now on appeal in the Ingham Circuit Court."

"It is one thing for earnings to be at such a low point in a period of depression and with a surplus of plant facilities; it is quite another to be limited to such a meager return at a time of inflation and shortage of plant facilities."

"If our plant were increased by the millions of dollars necessary to restore peacetime margins for better service, the rate of return obviously would dip to an even more shocking level. A growing business especially has to earn a good return to attract the capital needed for that growth."

"Any decision to increase rates is a hard one to make. It requires a trend in our operations which has brought rate reductions that are now saving our customers

Clerk Harry McCracken stated that application for a permit to sell soft drinks had been received from Harold H. Herrick, the new owner of "The Tank Grill", Grand River just west of Nine Mile Road.

\$20,000,000 a year compared with rates of a quarter of a century ago. "We have held off this decision as long as possible. Rate increases already have been requested in 29 other states. In 17 of those states, increased rates have been ordered by regulatory authorities. Sixteen independent telephone companies have been granted increases by the Michigan Public Service Commission and two more such applications are still pending."

"Michigan Bell has a legal and moral obligation to provide the best possible service to as many as ask for it, within the limits of its ability to do so. That obligation—to provide more and better service—will cost a lot of investment money from here on. The money must come from investors who put their money into this business only if assured a fair return. So that assurance can be provided under existing rates."

The alternative to increased telephone rates, in the final analysis, is inferior service. Poor service is an expensive luxury that neither an individual nor a community can afford. The new rates will be just as low as possible. They will be no higher than necessary for us to provide the kind of service our customers want."

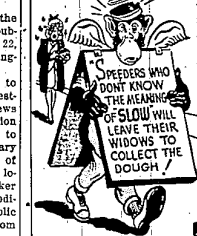
## NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING
