### OAKLAND COUNTY RED CROSS NOTES

Mrs. T. W. Eustis, chairman of home service of the Oakland County Chapter American Red Cross, announces that the home service department of the local chapter is well equipped to assist veterans in developing evidence to support claims for disability compensation. Staff members and volunteers of the local chapter are at the service of all veterans either wishing information or needing claims assistance. In addition, a Red Cross Field Director at Dearborn Veterans administration, not only assists in the filing of claims but is usually available to plead the case of the veteran before the rating board. Frequently there is no available record of treatment received while in service and local chapter workers can be of assistance in informing the veteran of certain types of evidence which will be acceptable to the Veterans Administration. A commonly used kind of evidence is the notarized statement of comrades in service who were present at the time an injury was received or treatment was given. Because of a vast network of chapters covering all states in the United States and including Hawaii, Alaska and the Philippines it is possible for the local chapter to call upon chapter facilities to secure such statements from comrades living in other communities.

Mrs. Eustis urges all veterans not to delay in filing claims in order that evidence may be available while circumstances can still be remembered. All veterans who wish to discuss claims service are asked to contact either of the two chapter offices, at 410 Pontiac State Bldg., Pontiac, or the South Oakland Office at 321 W. Sixth St., Royal Oak.
