The Board withheld action on this matter awaiting a report from the Church Finance committee. Dunkel stated that these two rooms will be necessary for the coming school year.

Domen moved that the Board extend a welcome to the teachers and employees of the schools through a planned evening program, at the beginning of the school year. The motion was seconded and passed.
