The night air was crisp and cool. With pine knots we built a friendly camp fire in front of the cabin and gazed at the deepening shadows on the lake. A rabbit hopped from the bank at the lake shore and vine. He ignored nonchalantly our invitations to come and share the warmth of our camp fire. Dumb bunny!

The next morning we beheld, trapped in a sink inside the cabin, a timid, trembling kangaroo mouse. He had missed the rare treat of butter-milk pancake flour, for which we were eternally grateful.

Was all this worth the effort, the toil of the long hike up the mountain trail? Yes, we think so. Life in Michigan is good, and we are at peace with the world.

The suggested rate increase would help protect the future quality of your telephone service.

zone message unit charges would apply on calls to these areas, instead of the present toll charges.

Community by community, Michigan Bell's proposed local rates are related to the number of telephones each subscriber could reach, and thus the amount of service he could get.
