Some of the figures about soil erosion are pretty startling, but they're true, nevertheless. Leonard Bramses, soil conservation specialist at Michigan Start College, reports that a test in Livingston county on a seven per cent slope showed there was 200 per cent more soil lost by erosion on up and down hill cultivation as there was on red clover-brome, plots. During some heavy showers 60 to 75 percent of the rain ran off. This heavy run-off caused the great soil loss.

FARMERS SHOULD LOCATE WHEAT FERTILIZER NOW

Fertilizer for winter wheat will be scarce again this year and farmiers should be on the lookout for their supply, according to Dr. C. J. Williar, head of the soil science department at Michigan State colment at Michigan State colment are using about double the amorat of commercial fertilizer they used in 1940. Dealers should be contacted immediately and delivery of available fertilizer taken whenever it appears on the market.

Fertilizers containing 12 per cent or more potash are desirable for wheat planting on sandy loan soils. However, many of these are not available, and the desire cannot supply high potash content fertilizers. Armers are advised to sceepe the state of the state

not use the 3-12-12 as the supply is limited and badly needed by farm

limited and badly needed by farin-ers on sandy loam soils.

Application at seeding time of 300 to 500 pounds per acre is suitable for wheat in which a legume is to be seeded. When clover or alfalfa are not to be seeded in the grain 200 to 400 pounds per acre is recommended.




