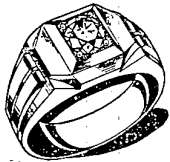

COUNTY MENTAL HYGIENE SOCIETY OUTLINES PROGRAM

Dr. David Slight of Chicago will address the first of four meetings of the Oakland County Chapter of Michigan Society for Mental Hygiene scheduled for the fall and winter. This open meeting will be held in the Guild Hall of Christ Church, Cranbrook, Bloomfield Hills, September 15, at 8:15 p.m.

Dr. Slight has always maintained a vigorous, active interest in community mental hygiene and social welfare in addition to his private practice of psychiatry. He is now Acting Superintendent of the Illinois Veterans' Rehabilitation Center. With this background of extensive experience he is well qualified to speak on the "Family and Mental Health".

He will present this subject to the layman in a generally informative way. In the afternoon he will also address professional people on the same subject. Doctors, clergy and social workers are urged to attend this afternoon symposium. All others interested in mental health will be welcome at the evening meeting.
