Internal Parasites Cut Wool Production in State

The recent announcement by the U. S. Department of Agriculture that the wool price support program was resumed August 15 and will continue through 1948, means that farmers should be preparing for their next year's crop with care. Graydon Blank, extension animal husbandryman at Michigan State college, believes that farmers will want to produce as many pounds of high quality wool as possible in order to take advantage of this support price.

Internal parasites in the flock should be controlled to keep the animals in best condition. Health and vigor can be improved by controlling the parasites with a salt and phenothiazine mixture made up of one pound of phenothiazine to twelve or fourteen pounds of salt. Drenching with phenothiazine also is effective and helps to keep the animals in good condition and results in a heavier growth of wool. Details of these treatments can be secured from the county agricultural agents.

MSC WORKS TO IMPROVE QUALITY OF PEACHES

"All that glitters is not gold". Neither are all peaches of the best flavor. Fruit growers always choose fruit at its best maturity and highest flavor for their own use. "Why, then, cannot all other consumers receive their peaches when at their best?" asks H. A. Cardwell, horticulturist at Michigan State college.

"The reasons", he continues, "are many and complex. All trees, all soils and all seasons do not produce fruit of like size, color or flavor. It is impossible. The entire industry is working to give more consumers better flavor and less spoilage at the lowest possible cost."

The farther peaches must be shipped the firmer they must be and the better must be the refrigeration. Without perfect refrigeration no one has cared to risk the loss often resulting from tree-ripened fruit. Adequate refrigeration has not always been available. Another restricting influence has been the long-time use of the bushel basket and the human characteristic of every purchaser demanding all the peaches that could possibly be jammed, squeezed or squashed into the basket.

For many years, growers, packers, shippers, receivers and consumers have been clamoring for everything that could be done to allow peaches to remain longer on the trees and still deliver them in a sound condition. To deliver firm, mature peaches requires that once or twice a week the trees be searched for the largest and ripest fruit. On healthy trees peaches usually swell in size just before reaching maturity, as most growers well know. To allow and protect quantity of peaches to reach maturity, growers and packing plants must have ample holding rooms at 32 degrees Fahrenheit to avoid glutting certain markets.

"The entire fruit trade agrees that the trend of small homes, smaller apartments and even smaller trailers, increases the demand for small packages," says Cardwell, "while the size of the fruit, when it leaves the tree, the greater is the need for small containers."

To answer some of these problems, Michigan State college has been assigning investigators to work on growing and packing problems for several decades. H. P. Gaston has studied fruit quality, packaging and marketing for many years and most growers and shippers are familiar with his publications. During recent years, T. A. Merrill, T. C. Stebbins, H. P. Gaston and H. A. Cardwell have been investigating consumer-type packaging of peaches for the department of horticulture. On the marketing side of the problem, the department of economics has assigned Arthur Mauch and M. E. Craven to study the condition and acceptance of Michigan peaches in the Detroit Stores of the Atlantic and Pacific Company in conjunction with several package manufacturers. This study is being continued in all new packages for the 1947 peach crop.
