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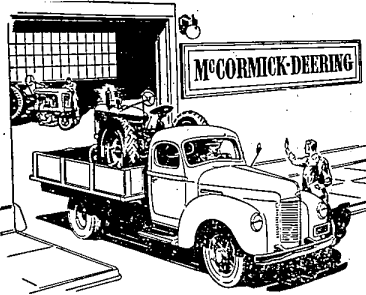

FARM FEATURES

Check Of Grain Storage Urged

Bran bugs and weevils are big enemies of grain stored in granaries, points out county agricultural agent Karl D. Bailey. He urges farmers to inspect their stored grain regularly from now on for evidence of damage by these insects.

Heated grain is a good indication that these pests are at work. Bran bugs and weevils can cause grain to heat enough to cause great damage in addition to the injury done by their feeding. Warm weather during the fall is very favorable for grain insects.

Fumigation is the best means of getting rid of bran bugs and weevils once they infest the grain. Ray L. James, extension entomologist at Michigan State college advises that careful attention must be paid to the conditions under which fumigation is done. The granary must be tight enough to prevent the fumigating material from escaping. Fumigation through the walls while fumigating is being done. The temperature of the grain must be above 55 degrees Fahrenheit when the work is done. The fumigant should be placed deeply in the stored grain and both granary and grain left undisturbed for 72 hours after treatment.

James recommends a mixture of three parts of ethylene dichloride and one part of carbon tetrachloride for fumigating. The carbon tetrachloride is essential because ethylene dichloride is explosive when used alone. Both substances are poisonous and must be used with great care. Avoid breathing the fumes. The mixture is used at the rate of one gallon to 200 bushels of grain.

Take the capacity of the granary into consideration, since one gallon of the mixture will not be enough for 200 bushels of grain in a 1000 bushel granary. County agricultural agent Bailey can give further information on the fumigation of stored grain.

"OPERATION WEEDS" — FOR CHICAGO



CHICAGO — "Miss Lake Michigan — 1947" takes the wheel of a specially rigged tractor to spread death among weeds during the first experiment conducted by the Chicago department of streets with the new war-born chemical, 2,4-D. Many other cities now have fleets of trucks and tractors rigged for spraying weeds away for a definite "kill" in place of the old fashioned method of cutting, which encourages future growth.

NEW AGREEMENT TO ENCOURAGE BETTER POTATOES

The four-state potato marketing agreement and order which were reinstated recently on recommendations of producers in Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota and Wisconsin will go into effect this week, according to an announcement by Fred Hibst, Cadillac, chairman of the North Central Potato Committee.

C. L. Nash, Michigan State College extension specialist in farm marketing, says that as far as present regulations under the marketing agreement are concerned it is proposed only to prevent the marketing of culls. We have no provisions under the Michigan grading law allowing the marketing of culls. Such a program should encourage the marketing of a better grade of potatoes.

The marketing agreement, requires that all potatoes marketed in this area shall be inspected by the Federal-State inspection service. The cull regulation prohibits shipping and sale of potatoes graded less than U. S. No. 2. The committee expects that, because of considerable hollow heart and other types of damage this year, some exceptions will be requested. Exceptions to this provision can be granted only by the Secretary of Agriculture and nearly a week is required for action on any request.

Artificial Breeders Report Progress

Very good progress in the artificial breeding program in the Southwest corner of Oakland County has been made. Mr. Glen Robinson, inseminator manager reports that at the close of the first year some 500 cows have been served, although these records are as yet incomplete. 50 cows in the association have already freshened. Mr. Robinson estimated that 50 per cent of the calves are heifers. He states that all calves are showing good health. He stated that so far the farm with the best batting average as far as number of heifer calves born goes to Mr. William Ploch of Milford with 4 heifers out of 9 calves dropped so far.

The annual meeting of the association will take place in October at which time and complete records will be forthcoming.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture forecasts more butter, cheese and evaporated milk than last year will be on hand the rest of 1947. Milk output will be about the same but less is likely to be used in fluid form.

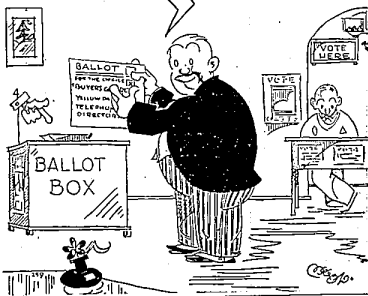

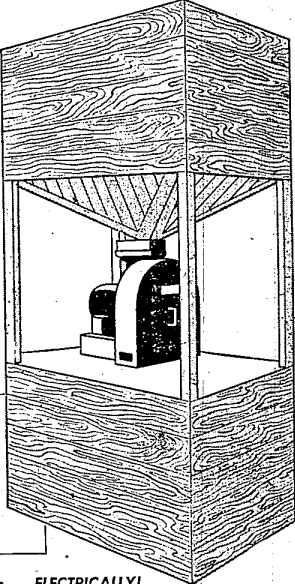
