



FARMINGTON BOYS OFFERED NROTC SCHOLARSHIPS

Superintendent C. E. Duncel announced this week that applications for scholarships in the NROTC program for interested students in the Naval Reserve Officers Corps are now available at the Farmington High School.

Various high schools throughout the state are acting as information agencies for this program. Duncel stated that anyone interested in the program can secure the information during school hours at the high school principal's office.

Candidates must be citizens of the United States, must be physically fit, must agree to remain unmarried until they receive their commission and must agree to accept a commission in either the Navy or Marine Corps. If the candidate is a minor he must have the consent of his parents.

A nation-wide aptitude test will be held December 13 to select candidates for next fall's training courses. Tests will be given at Pontiac Royal Oak, Dearborn, Ann Arbor and Detroit. Candidates or any one interested in the program should get their application forms and fill them as soon as possible.

Those selected will attend one of the colleges or universities approved by the Navy. About 2,500 will be selected for the four-year course beginning with the fall term of 1948. Students will get the cost of tuition and text books and a retainer pay of \$600 per year while in college.

Two summer cruises are required in addition to their college courses and a special aviation indoctrination course is required.

(Continued from Page One) walls. No one knows just what. The use of plasma before the operation can prevent that blood vessel wall change. Plasma also helps prevent the effects of hemolytic transfusion reaction. Plasma is more and more frequently being used in just such a preventative manner.

Another use for plasma, little known by the public, is in nephrosis, a frequently fatal kidney disorder most of whose victims are children. In nephrosis the kidneys fail to retain vital protein. Use of plasma restores the proteins lost by the failing kidneys until the body can adjust itself and recover from the condition.

"I wish that every prospective donor in Farmington could see the use to which we put this plasma by-product of their blood. I wish they could see the faces of visiting relatives when they are told that their loved ones will live, many of them living on 'borrowed time' only because their fellow residents here have a pint of blood in the civilian plasma program. Words can't express what plasma means to us, to the family and to our patients who work to save lives. We can't get this lifesaver anywhere else but from the veins of other people. There is no substitute for blood."
