Corn, wheat and oats are the three great grain crops. Before World War II, corn production averaged about 2 1/2 billion bushels; wheat, about 800 million; and oats, about 1 billion. A bushel of wheat, however, weighs nearly twice as much as a bushel of oats, so wheat ranks ahead of oats in total weight produced.
