Trojans Swamped At Grosse Ile

It was a hectic afternoon for Clarenceville's football team last Friday as they not only were swamped by a strong Grosse Ile eleven 25 to 0, but lost the services of their star fullback, Mike Sinacola, who suffered a broken forearm in the first period.

Sinacola will be out of action for the rest of the season. Coach Lloyd Samuels will probably put Charles Rousseau into the fullback position. He has been playing end so for this season.

Clarenceville showed considerable promise in the opening minutes of play as they went on the offensive. They made several large gains in ground attack against Grosse Ile. However, in the middle of the period, Sinacola was hurt and taken out of the game. Rousseau was moved into the fullback position and Bailey went in at end. On the next play on a hand off from Riddell, Trojan quarterback Bob Sonnenberg, a Grosse Ile tackle broke through to snag the ball and went all the way for the first touchdown.

Neither team scored in the second period as Clarenceville broke down after their team reorganization. Both teams confined their activities to running and line buck plays.

However, Grosse Ile broke loose in the third period to score two more touchdowns, both on running plays, as Clarenceville's defense crumbled. They went on in the last quarter to add another, making the final score 25 to 0 in favor of Grosse Ile.

Clarenceville will play Roosevelt High School, Dearborn, this Friday on the Trojan gridiron.

When he uncorked a pass to Jerry Fisher, who went to the Birmingham 10 yard line before he was brought down for a gain of about 25 yards. On the next play McLean again went back and shot a quick pass to Ernie Tyler, Farmington end, who snugged it behind the end for the first score. The kick for the extra point was blocked, and Farmington took the lead 6 to 0.

After several minutes of the third quarter, Farmington in possession of the ball again took to the air in a series of short passes the Falcons began to roll. Starting on Birmingham's 40 yard line, Farmington moved deep into enemy territory. McLean again set up the touchdown play when he shot a quick pass to Bob Weaver, speedy Falcon back. Weaver broke away to charge to the Birmingham 3 yard line before he was "brought down from behind. However, on the next play, Weaver drove over for the second Farmington touchdown on a line buck. Again Birmingham charged in to block the kick for the extra point. At the end of the third period Farmington lead 12 to 0.

In the closing minutes of play Birmingham opened up. On a series of long passes plus a Falcon 15 yard penalty, Birmingham drove deep into Farmington territory. Farmington put up a desperate goal line stand but after three charges into the Falcon line, Burdick, Birmingham captain and left halfback, drove over. The kick for the extra point was good, and the score stood at Farmington 12 - Birmingham 7.

Birmingham immediately kicked off and Tyler snugged the ball on the run back. The game was over before Farmington could run another play and the Falcons took their second straight victory.

Farmington will play their first Inter-Lakes League contest of the season this Friday when they travel to Keego Harbor. The game will begin at 3:30 p.m.

Thursday afternoon the Falcon Freshman eleven will open six game schedule when they meet Redford Union's Freshman team on the Farmington gridiron. The game will begin at 4:00. On Tuesday the Freshman team, will travel to Wayne for their second game of the season.
